band of cloth was tightly placed around his eyes and head.

He walked to the death chair with a swinging stride. When he came opposite the door of the blacksmith shop behind which were stationed the five riflemen, Hillstrom passed the 23 witnesses in their places.

He tried to remove the blindfold, but was prevented by the straps which had been drawn around his arms and waist.

Buckled into Big Chair He was led to the big congress chair, about 20 paces distant from the five holes in the door of the blacksmith shop from which the muzzles of the rifles protruded.

Doctors tested his heart. It was pumping hard. They pinned the white target above his heart, and the white mark stood out boldly against his black prison shirt.

Dies With a Grin Sheriff Corless shouted "Aim."

"Fire, let 'er go," shrieked Hillstrom, mockingly.

"Fire," commanded Corless. Five rifles spoke. Hillstrom's body sagged down.

An eleventh-hour attempt to save Hillstrom failed.

A Seattle man named Busky was reported to have signed an affidavit furnishing an alibi, claiming he was in Hillstrom's company elsewhere than at the scene on the night the murder of Morrison and his son was committed.

Hillstrom himself swept even this small hope of life aside.

Denies He Knows Him "I don't know Busky," he said, in his cell, when officials questioned him. That settled Hillstrom's fate.

Despite threats of death sent Gov. Spry, complete with letters saying buildings would be wrecked, the city was quiet. No disorder occurred during or after the execution.

The marksmen's aim was perfect. The four bullets entered over Hillstrom's heart in a square which had been covered by a silver dollar.

While circumstantial evidence convicted Hillstrom of the murders, his own attempt to defend himself in court and his refusal to tell where he was on the night of the crime helped to send him to his doom.

Don't Believe His Story Hillstrom's plea was that he was in a married woman's company, and he consistently adhered to the declaration that he would rather die than ruin her good name. This story was not credited by the authorities.

Hillstrom appeared shortly after the murders with a bullet wound in his shoulder. Blood spots showed that the Morrisons wounded their assailant.

The man with whom Hillstrom lived disappeared after the murder. The missing man was believed to have been Hillstrom's accomplice, witnesses at the trial testifying that two men of their general appearance were seen loitering around the Morrison grocery.

If there was a married woman in whose home Hillstrom was on the night of the Morrison murders, she made no effort to save him.

The execution followed summary rejection by Gov. Spry of President Wilson's request for a halt, and subsequent reopening of the case. In this the governor resented what he deemed an interference that Hillstrom had not been fairly tried.

6 MORE BODIES ARE REMOVED

Rescuers Expect to Get All Bodies Out of Mine by Night

FIRST FUNERALS HELD RAVENSDALE, Nov. 19.—Six more bodies were recovered during the night from the third level of the Northwestern Improvement Co.'s mine. This brings the total recovered to 16, with 15 bodies still underground.

All hopes that any of the men still entombed, following Tuesday's explosion, would be found alive was definitely abandoned Thursday.

Gangs of men working in shifts of six hours pounded away steadily at the twisted mass of timbering and coal and dirt still blocking the entrance to the third level, and during the night succeeded in penetrating the corridor.

It was reported that all bodies would be recovered before tonight. The bodies recovered last night were those of Pat J. Dowd, Thomas Speck, Joe Krainic, Noah Goodman, Jack Muncie and an Italian whose identity was not learned. The body recovered yesterday has not been identified as yet.

The first of the mine victims' funerals were held yesterday, and will continue as more bodies are recovered.

With at least \$75,000 to be paid in pensions by the industrial insurance commission as a result of the explosion, there is only \$8,613 to the credit of the company in the accident fund. A levy probably will be made on other mines, to be paid back gradually.

Gen. Obregon reported that after several hours' fighting he routed a Villa force at Del Rio.

Hermosillo was badly battered by artillery in a second fight, according to Carranzista reports.

No credence was placed in the rumors that Gen. Villa had been seriously wounded.
