

# MONASTIR HAS FALLEN, REPORT

Bulgar Victory Rumored; Serb Army Making Its Last Stand

## FACES ANNIHILATION

LONDON, Nov. 15.—The Bulgars have occupied Monastir, it was reported here today.

The story, however, was unconfirmed, but the authorities agreed the Serb situation is desperate and the allies in the Balkans are not yet strong enough to help them much.

## ALLIES ATTACK BULGARS

ATHENS, Nov. 15.—Allied troops bravely tried today to distract the Bulgars from their Southeastern Serbian campaign where they are sweeping everything before them. The French hurled strong groups against the Bulgars on the Vardar river.

Already they have been somewhat successful, but it is feared they are not numerous enough to follow up their advantage. They have repeatedly requested that reinforcements be sent them. Numerous forces were reported to be at Salonika, but the problem of getting them to the scene of the fighting in time makes the situation dubious.

ROME, Nov. 15.—Austrian aeroplanes flew over Venice last night, dropping bombs, but with little damage, it was announced today.

# DREARY COAST A SHIP GRAVEYARD

Fullest Development of Alaska Depends on Government Action.

## MUST FACE THE FACTS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 15.—The U. S. government faces the job of throwing more light on Alaskan waters.

Chains of lighthouses must be built along the 26,000 miles of Alaska's coast to make navigation safer or the fullest development of our "Far North" territory will never be realized.

On Sept. 20, 1914, the United States revenue cutter "Tahoma" struck an uncharted pinnacle rock of Agattu island in the western Aleutians, and went down.

During the summer season last year two other vessels, the "Parameta" and the "Gayhead" struck submerged pinnacles and were wrecked.

Others escaped almost by a miracle, some "scraping" or "touching" pinnacle rocks.

Worth Half Million  
The three ships that went down in 1914 were worth in the neighborhood of \$500,000.

In the recent years there have been lost more than 500 lives and property valued at more than \$3,000,000 because of the lack of lighthouses and the fact that much of the coast is absolutely uncharted.

With three exceptions there are no lighthouses at all from icy strait, in Southeastern Alaska, to Nome, a distance of nearly 3,000 miles.

Hinchbrook island at the entrance to Prince William sound has a lighthouse, and there are two at Unimak Pass, where vessels pass north thru the Aleutian chain, but these are all in that stretch of coast.

More Lines Will Come  
The summer of 1916 will probably see the beginning of the shipment of coal from Alaska to the Pacific Coast.

Steamship lines will multiply between the Pacific Coast ports and the ports of Alaska.

It is time to face the pressing question which will arise because of these facts.
