## FORD BUSY ORGANIZING COMMITTEES ON HIS VESSEL TO TAKE UP PEACE WORK IN EUROPE

### FORD PEACE SHIP VIEWS AND CHIEF OFFICERS

ABOARD S. S. OSCAR II.  
(By Wireless to Sigconsent, Mass.)—Dec. 6.—Henry Ford, promoter of the peace ship and peace congress plan to get Europe's warriors out of the trenches by Christmas, turned today to organizing peace committees.

These will comprise clergymen, students and others, including newspaper men.

Their purpose is to meet corresponding committees from neutral nations abroad, and to co-operate in election of an international peace commission to sit in Copenhagen for the remainder of the war.

Chief Object Publicity  
This body would receive and offer peace proposals, but its business primarily would be to give wide publicity to peace suggestions.

Some of the delegates, including Ford and other leaders, probably will attempt to cross Germany from Denmark to Holland.

Despite the fact that their passports read only to neutral countries, it is believed the authorities will not dare to interfere with this mission.

Is Shown Over Ship  
The Oscar II is neither an ocean greyhound nor a floating Ritz-Carlton. She is just a comfortable 10,900-ton craft. In her cleanliness she is characteristically Scandinavian.

First Officer A. Schmidt is proud in showing you over the ship. He pointed out Ford's PLAIN SIXTY-DOLLAR CABIN; he pointed out the pictures of the king and queen of Denmark in the main saloon; he got out a chart and explained the detour the ship now has to make north of the Orkneys and Shetlands to avoid the mines in the Pentland Firth and to enable the British naval patrol to inspect the ship's manifests and passenger lists at Kirkwell—the port of missing ships these days.

Bar Flags and Bunting  
Ford's dream ship is not going to enter the war zone all dressed up in festive fashion. There will be no flags and no bunting.

Ford's trip is not going to be a joy ride.

Concerts and dances will be discouraged.

Capt. Hempel, the hardy old skipper of the Oscar II, is dumb, deaf and blind on the war, and Ford's pilgrimage.

Being a sailor who is, and has been for the past 16 months, dodging in and out of English and German fleets of warships, he is eloquently neutral.

"Now don't you think, captain, this a grand scheme of Ford's?"

Captain Hempel leaned over the side of the sturdy ship, and gazing on the huge Danish flag painted on her hull to keep German submarines away, remarked:

"If the war is all wrong, and Ford and his friends think they can make it cease, the I will guarantee that on the next voyage I won't run the Oscar II onto the rocks!"

### RUMANIA MAY BE NEXT BATTLE SPOT IN EUROPE

ATHENS, Dec. 6.—Rumanian concentration appeared imminent today. Presumably to meet it, the 15th German division has been rushed to Rutchok, on the edge of Rumania, in Northeastern Bulgaria.

Russians also are expected to land there. Hence the division may find it necessary to repel this move, as well as engage the Rumanians.

Germany is reported, and is sending heavy artillery to the Rumanian border from the Western front.

While reports concerning the attitude of Greece have been conflicting, the latest version today is that King Constantine will privately assure the allies that he will grant their demands in full.

SHELLED, BUT ESCAPES  
LONDON, Dec. 6.—The British vessel Japanese Prince, after a five-hour chase, in which she was heavily shelled, escaped a German submarine pursuer.

### MORE ARRESTS ARE EXPECTED IN BOMB PLOT

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 6.—New arrests this week in the alleged bomb conspiracy of Baron George Wilhelm Von Brincken, C. C. Crowley and L. J. Smith, seemed today to be inevitable.

With the arrest of Von Brincken, the German army officer, Saturday, on a charge of plotting to destroy munitions ships and plants by "fire and dynamite," the government felt today that it had taken a long step toward uncovering a conspiracy more far-reaching and startling than any anti-ally activities thus far brought to light.

The federal grand jury was slated to resume its sitting today.
