



Port May Be on Belt Line on Authority of Majority Vote

Ask Counsel for Ruling on Whether 60 Per Cent Vote Is Necessary; If It Isn't, Work Will Be Started at Once; If It Is, Proposal Will Be Resubmitted

The proposed port commission belt line railroad along the water front may be constructed, despite the fact that the propositions providing for transfer of funds with which to construct it failed to receive 60 per cent of the votes cast at Saturday's election.

This was determined by the port commission at a special session held Monday afternoon.

Port Attorney C. J. France was instructed to render an opinion as to whether 60 per cent of the total vote is necessary to carry bond transfer issues, and was asked to have his opinion ready for the regular meeting Wednesday afternoon.

If he decides that 60 per cent is necessary, the commission will resubmit all four of the propositions calling for bond transfer at a special election, to be called March 6, the same day as the city election.

If he decides that 60 per cent is not necessary, the commission plans to proceed immediately with construction of the belt line.

There is no law requiring that a 60 per cent vote is necessary for bond transfer, but it is recognized that it is necessary for voting bonds.

The 60 per cent requirement in the matter of bond transfer is recognized as purely arbitrary, and is the result of a ruling by Harold Preston, former attorney for the port, who on a former occasion, when bonds voted for one fund were to be transferred to another of a slightly different nature, ruled that it was advisable that they have

a 60 per cent majority.

If the proposition calling for transfer of bonds with which to construct the belt line and again submitted at a special election, it will be on the ground that a great number of King county voters were misled at the last election by the kept press of the city and county, which worked to unscrupulous ends in misrepresenting the true issue for the benefit of the railroads and favored shippers.

W. S. Lincoln, auditor for the port commission, has shouldered all blame for the shortage of ballots at Saturday's election, and Prosecutor Lundin has dropped the matter.

Robert F. Booth, defeated candidate for the commission, says he will not contest the election, but it is conceded that any one of the voters deprived of a ballot could bring an action to invalidate the election.

HE'D NEVER GET RICH; EXPLAINS SUICIDE MOTIVE

His dying statement tinged with the cynic's bitterness, John Carlson, 203 Dexter ave., told hospital authorities early this morning the motive for his suicide.

"I have been out of work for a year and a half," he said, "and have concluded that I would never be rich."

A few minutes later he died.

Carlson shot himself in the left breast. His wife, who is employed in a laundry here, found him several hours later. The city hospital responded promptly, but Carlson was beyond recovery.

HOPES VATICAN CAN END STRIFE

Pope Tells Cardinals It Will Be Clearing House for Ideas

URGES COMPROMISE

ROME, Dec. 7.—Pope Benedict hopes to make the Vatican a clearing house for peace ideas.

This is the outstanding conclusion drawn here today from his allocution as made public in full.

"While we seek with all our resources to alleviate the painful consequences of this war," the pope told the consistory, "we feel obliged by our apostolic office to incite anew the only means that can quickly put an end to this tremendous conflagration."

In this, it is generally thought he meant that the Vatican should have a powerful hand.

The means of reaching peace, he suggested, is by compromise on all sides, lest prolongation of the struggle mean for Europe the beginning of decadence from the degree of prosperous civilization, to which the Christian religion has raised her from nothing.

At the same time, he suggested that an end ought to be made now "so as not to assume before God and man the enormous responsibility for the continuation of this shedding of blood, of which history records no counterpart."

WAR COUNCIL MEETS

TO SAFEGUARD SEATTLE WATER

Council Considers Matter of Condemning Cedar Falls

AQUEDUCT SUGGESTED

A solution to the problem of how best to safeguard the source of the city's water supply from impurities will be sought when the council finance committee meets Thursday.

Last spring the town of Cedar Falls was flooded by an overflow from Rattlesnake lake. Cedar Falls residents blamed the flood to seepage from the new dam.

Whether Cedar Falls will be condemned by the city or whether damage claims by residents there will be fought, will be determined, probably Thursday.

Councilman Erickson will present a plan for a pipe line or aqueduct, extending from the Cedar Falls power plant to Landsburg, the intake of the water supply. All dangers of impurities from Cedar Falls and from Taylor, which also lies in the watershed, would thus be eliminated.

Out of eight bids received on the \$75,000 water extension utility bonds, the council accepted that of the National City bank at par and a premium of \$7.50. The bonds bear 5 per cent interest.

Bills appropriating \$12,000 and \$7,500 from the general fund, for planning Rainier ave., from Kenny to Thistle sts. and from Hanford

to Edmunds sts. respectively, were introduced by Councilman Lundy.
