FIND HUMPHREY WAS 'IN' ON SITE

Treasury Department Looks Into Seattle Post-office Deal

GIVE OUT 2 LETTERS

BY GILSON GARDNER WASHINGTON, Dec. 6.—The treasury department, in looking into the purchase of the cat-tail marsh for a postoffice site at Seattle, finds that Representative Will Humphrey did have a finger in the pie.

Following his denial of any connection with the affair, the department has allowed to become public two letters written by Humphrey to the treasury department in which it is shown that Humphrey was closely following all the proceedings of the purchase of the marsh for a postoffice site.

On October 12, 1910, Humphrey wrote to the department concerning ugly rumors that were afloat about this postoffice site.

He asked that the matter be held in abeyance until he could confer personally with treasury officials. He had some things to say, he wrote, that he didn't want to put on paper.

On July 19, 1911, Humphrey transmitted to the department a letter from the secretary of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce about this postoffice site.

And on August 21, 1911, Humphrey wrote to the treasury, urging that "the price desired by Hill was reasonable."

He wrote that "if the department had doubts it could immediately begin condemnation proceedings."

And he said further, that he wanted "to see the matter go forward without delay, as I told you in our conversation."

In view of the statement issued by Humphrey on November 8, 1915, saying, "I refused to take any part in this postoffice site deal," and there is not one thing to show that I interested myself in it in any way—nor did I," the government officials have lowered their estimate of Representative Humphrey's public utterances.

Sells Ice Cream Concession for Panama Canal Zone to Yakima Men; Now Promoter Goes to Pen

E. C. Hazeltine, a promoter, is under sentence here Wednesday to serve three to 15 years in the Monroe reformatory for "granting" Elmer and Alonzo Hoover, brothers, from North Yakima, an exclusive franchise to sell ice cream in the Panama Canal zone.

He met the brothers at the depot on their arrival here, October 19. They were seeking to make their fortunes in the city, they told him, and had enough money to start business on a small scale. To prove it, they displayed their respective "rolls."

Hazeltine pleaded guilty before Judge Gilliam in superior court Tuesday afternoon to accepting \$927 of their capital.

According to information furnished by the prosecuting attorney's office, Hazeltine represented himself to the young men as part owner of the Seattle Ice Cream company and also informed them he was a government employe.

As such, he told them he believed he had a proposition that might interest them. He disclosed a plan by which they might achieve mil-

NATIONAL JURY OF MEDICS TO PASS ON LIFE OR DEATH OF DEFECTIVE BABIES

DRS. ROBINSON AND HALSELDEN TO LEAD IN ORGANIZATION OF SCIENTISTS TO ACT ON SUCH CASES AS THOSE OF THE BOLLINGER AND ROBERTS INFANTS—NEXT PART OF THE NEW PROPAGANDA FOR BIRTH CONTROL SWEEPING THE COUNTRY!

NEW YORK, Dec. 2.—A plan for a great medical court of last resort, to pass upon such life and death cases as those of the defective Bollinger baby and also the Roberts baby, the case now stirring all New York, was announced here today by Frederick H. Robinson, editor of the Medical Review of Reviews, and leader in the fight for birth control laws in the United States.

Dr. Robinson also declared Dr. H. R. Haiselden, who, on its mother's plea, allowed the Bollinger baby to die, is rushing here in a fast train to take part in the launching of the movement.

The disagreement over the advisability of operating on the Roberts baby, which has cut the widest rift in the ranks of medical men here in many years, is the cause of this movement for a medical high court, which Dr. Robinson explained.

"We must evolve some way to deal with such problems as that presented by the Roberts baby," he said. "This child, born with a protruding spine, is the cause of an absolute disagreement as to whether a desperate operation should be performed on the very slight chance that the little one's life can be saved, or whether nature shall be allowed to take its course and the child be permitted to die."

"The specialists who are against operating declare the operation would only be a needless expense to the family, as the little one cannot possibly be saved. Others, however, disagree."

"We need a high court of medicine, and this court or council, or whatever it may be called, must be made up of men who will inspire confidence in their decisions."

"Dr. Haiselden is coming here to discuss with myself and others the problems brought up by the Bollinger and Roberts cases, and within a few days we shall have our new movement well under way."

"I think our first move will be to get in touch with thousands of parents of defective children, so that we may know how the people themselves feel about the birth of these unfortunates, who are coming into the world at such an alarming rate."
