ALLIES SPLIT ON BALKAN POLICY

England Wants to Withdraw Troops From Salonika

FRANCE IS OBJECTING

PARIS, Dec. 8.—England and her allies are reported at odds over the Balkan situation. Against the wishes of her colleagues, England is reported in favor of withdrawal of the Balkan expeditionary forces. She showed her hand, it is hinted, in the two days' war council of all the allied military heads. The other allies are said to insist on continuance of the campaign to aid the Serbs. "If England persists in favoring departure from Salonika," said a high French official, "then the remainder of the allies will continue to aid the Serbs."

AEROPLANES COLLIDE AMSTERDAM, Dec. 8.—Four men aboard two German aeroplanes were unrecognizably burned when their machines, in maneuvering Monday night over Eller Bruck, collided.

Persons below were horrified to see the two machines lock. The tanks burst in a sudden flash of flame, and the machines came to earth with a crash, with the bodies entangled in the ruins.

TO TELL GERMANY'S TERMS AMSTERDAM, Dec. 8.—Germany's terms for concluding peace, coupled with announcement of her Balkan intentions, are expected to be given tomorrow by Chancellor Bethmann-Hollweg before the Reichstag. The chancellor has presented his speech to the kaiser for approval, hence any remarks he makes will be Germany's official position.

TURKS CALL IT BLUFF BERLIN, Dec. 8.—The allies have renewed their offensive in the Dardanelles, according to Constantinople advices, but the Turks regard the fresh movements as a "bluff."

DESTROY BRITISH SHIP LONDON, Dec. 8.—One British monitor was fired and four other vessels were captured by the Turks in an attack near Kut-el Hamara, the Constantinople war office claimed today.

PLAN TO HOLD BELGIUM AMSTERDAM, Dec. 8.—In driving the first nail for the wooden statue of Gen. Von Emmich, conqueror of Belgium, at Liege, Count Schultenber was quoted today as saying: "We will hold Belgium."

MONTENEGRO WANTS PEACE BERLIN, Dec. 8.—King Nicholas of Montenegro, has suggested to the allies that they allow him to conclude a separate peace, because Montenegro is exhausted, according to the Frankfurter Zeitung today.

CONSOLIDATION IS NO ISSUE IN CLUB ELECTION

The matter of consolidating with the Chamber of Commerce will not be considered in the annual election of officers for the Commercial Club, Dec. 27, according to Secretary Otto Case.

Robert Boyns, nominated Tuesday night for re-election as president of the club, recently took a stand in favor of consolidation, in opposition to the views held by many members of the club. This, however, will have no bearing on the election, Case declares.

WEALTHY MAN IS ROBBED, THEN THROWN IN CELL

For pure hard luck, James P. Perkins, a wealthy mining man of Berkeley, Cal., winner of a gold exhibit at the San Francisco fair, has a good claim for the banner prize today.

Perkins, who lived at the Latona hotel while here, was walking down Marion st. at 10 o'clock last night on the way to the water front to get a boat to Victoria.

ORDER PSYCHIC TO LEAVE TOWN

William Overton Grabs Opportunity to Quit Seattle

PAYS HIS \$200 FINE

"Dr." William Overton, psychic "spider," will spin no more his web for women in the Booth building. He has wracked his last home in the state of Washington.

Justice Brinker has given him until Thursday to leave the state or submit to the alternative of serving a month's sentence in the county jail. He also fined Overton \$200.

The Star learned that Overton's business was that of exploiting the curiosity of women, telling them their husbands were unfaithful, guaranteeing to "frame up" evidence for divorce and to obtain "soul-mates" for women clients.

Prosecuting Attorney Lundin was informed of Overton's operations and the former ordered his arrest. With him was arrested R. Archer, his alleged assistant.

Archer will be tried in a few weeks for statutory vagrancy, the same charge that was lodged against Overton.

Overton made no attempt to deny the information obtained by The Star. Two women detectives from whom he had accepted money for his "services" were present in the courtroom when he was arraigned Saturday.

Enters Plea of Guilty Overton's attorney suggested that owing to his client's ill health, a prison cell would be an unfit place for him, and pleaded for leniency.

"How long will it take you to leave the state?" asked the court. "Twenty-four hours," Overton replied quickly.

"I'll give you longer than that," Brinker said, "but you must pay the fine."

Overton had Big Sum Overton charged \$11 for "soul-mates," and when arrested had more than \$2,000 in checks, gold and silver in his pockets.

WOMEN AID INDEPENDENT BREMERTON, Dec. 8.—The independents won every office but two in the Bremerton city election yesterday. A. F. Reeves being chosen mayor over J. C. Baer, incumbent, by 34 votes. The women gave the independents active support.

BOWMAN RE-ELECTED CHARLESTON, Dec. 8.—M. M. Bowman was elected mayor and most of the present city officials were re-elected here yesterday.

NON-PARTISANS WIN AUBURN, Dec. 8.—The non-partisan ticket practically made a clean sweep in the election here yesterday, and many of the old office holders were voted out of office. Dr. M. J. Lacey was elected mayor.
