COUSIN OF YUAN SHOT IN FRISCO; POLITICAL PLOT?

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 27.—Fearful that the assassination of Wong Yuen Yung, cousin of the Chinese emperor here, would lead to a war between rival gunmen in local Chinatown, police today trailed every possible clue to his slayer.

What little they could glean from persons unfriendly to the murdered Chinese tended to confirm their view that he was slain by monarchist sympathizers because he deserted Yuan Shi Kai's cause.

Yung was shot from ambush as he rose from dinner in the exclusive Shaghai Low restaurant Saturday evening.

Editor Wong, of the Young China newspaper revealed that Yung had written him a confidential letter saying he had broken with the emperor because he disagreed with his monarchist ambitions.

This letter followed circulation of Chinese reports that Yung was an agent of the emperor, here on a secret mission.

Affairs in China are trembling on the brink of revolution, advices indicate.

Assistant Editor Chang of the Young China newspaper, reported receipt of cablegrams telling of three provinces, supposedly Yuan's bulwark of strength, wavering.

DR. HAZZARD BACK FROM WALLA WALLA; STILL BELIEVES IN FASTING SYSTEM AS SURE AID TO HEALTH, SHE DECLARES

Mothers influence—some one to go among the prisoners and radiate sympathy and faith—is the one outstanding need in prison life. Such is the conviction of Mrs. Linda Burfield Hazzard.

Dr. Hazzard (at right) and Mary Edwards, who accompanied her as a friend from Seattle to Walla Walla at the time of her incarceration. The picture was taken just before Dr. Hazzard left to serve her sentence.

Linda Burfield Hazzard, after spending a year and six months behind the bars at the state penitentiary at Walla Walla.

Still resolute in her conviction that she has never violated a law of God or man, the woman who has to say "I was persecuted by the medical profession simply because I had another way."

Mrs. Hazzard is in Seattle, at the McKay apartments. Still bearing the stamp of prison influence—a cramped way of walking and a pale complexion—she talks freely of the way prisons do not reform.

"I am weak," she said, "but not mentally weak, although that is one of the things I had to guard most against. I kept mentally vigorous by reading, reading, reading. I went thru volume after volume of science, philosophy and fiction. Twice I fasted in prison. Each time I went for 28 days without food. Sometimes I painted.

"The inmates are treated well enough by the authorities at Walla Walla. But the system is wrong. The wicked at heart are thrown together and the prison serves as a clearing house for them. They exchange ideas. Prison life is destructive, mentally and physically. I feel 1,000 years older."

When word came to Mrs. Hazzard that the state was going to give her back her freedom, she asked one favor.

Her first thought was a desire to go in among the men that were destined to remain back of the

SEND OUT CALL FOR RELIEF OF NEEDY BELGIUM

Judge Burke, chairman of the Washington committee for Belgium relief, has issued a call for clothing to protect 3,000,000 destitute people in Belgium and Northern France.

"If we can provide them with material," he said, "the sufferers will make their own apparel."

He has just received word from the New York office of the relief organization that unless immediate steps are taken to furnish clothing, thousands of unprotected men, women and children non-combatants are not likely to survive the winter.

"Unfortunately the sanitary measures taken by German occupants of the territory," he said, "prevent second hand clothing from entering the country."

This was the announcement Monday of the park board, which is placing faith in the ability of caretaker Hackett, of Seward park, to trap the animal.

A Christmas day hunt for the big cat availed nothing, nor did the efforts of Gust Kaupden, veterinarian of the Woodland park zoo, to drive the brute off the park land succeeded.

The cougar's favorite haunt is Seward park, on Bailey peninsula in Lake Washington. A large trap, baited with fresh meat, has been set there.

If captured, the cat will be placed in the zoo.

INCENDIARY FIRE DAMAGES A CARGO

NEW YORK, Dec. 27.—Fire in the hold of the British liner Inchmear, at her dock, early today, damaged her sugar cargo to the extent of \$75,000.

Capt. Pye scouted the theory of spontaneous combustion.

"They say sugar burns spontaneously," he remarked, "but before the war we never heard of sugar bursting into flame. I think German agents started the fire on the Inchmear by mixing in a white chemical with the sugar."

SEVEN DIE WHEN ITALIAN LINER IS SUNK BY SUB.

PARIS, Dec. 27.—Six passengers and one seaman perished, but 150 others were saved, when the Italian liner Port Said was sunk by a submarine, according to Milan dispatches today.

These messages reported that the attacking undersea boat flew Austrian colors.

The Port Said's call for help was answered by an Italian destroyer, which pursued the submarine for miles. The submarine, however, escaped by diving.

FORD PEACERS COAXING BACK DOVE OF PEACE

STOCKHOLM, Dec. 27.—The Ford peace expedition sought today to coax back into the dovecote the dove of peace that escaped while the party was en route to Europe.

The new management is trying to prevent further secessions from the ranks and at the same time stir a new spirit of harmony.

Rev. Jenkin Lloyd Jones believes there is still a chance for partial success if the harmony ensues.

At a meeting last night, leaders explained Ford's plans to enlist 300 socialists who would probably support the program staunchly.

The Swedish press today declared the expedition might have hastened peace if it had been properly managed.

The latest secession from the ranks was that of Mrs. Inez Mulholland Boissevan of New York, who attacked the autocratic control of the expedition.
