WILSON AND HIS BRIDE SLEUTHED THRU HONEYMOON

Woman Reporter Finds President and Mrs. Wilson Are so Carefully Guarded by Secret Service Men That They Can't Even Hold Hands in Private; Detectives Are With Them Constantly.

HOT SPRINGS, Va., Jan. 3.—SLEUTHED THRU A HONEYMOON!

What a splendid title for a detective story! It seems too bad that I must write it on a more news event, even if it does concern the president of these United States and his beautiful wife.

I came here to this lovely Virginia resort to wander along "the honeymoon trail" of our foremost citizen and the new "first lady"—to tell the people of this country of Mr. and Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, bridal lovers.

I imagined the passage of tender glances between the two, of his helping her over these rolling hills as they went on their long, solitary rambles or of isolated tete-a-tetes in distant corners of the Homestead hotel.

And the composite picture would show to all Americans the human Woodrow Wilson—the lover-president!

DETECTIVES GUARD THEM EVEN AT NIGHT But just think of being followed every step by seven secret service men!

Think of having a detective chauffeur when you motor, a detective caddy when you golf and even a detective sentry just outside the door of your bridal suite, not only in the day, but even at night, while you sleep.

But it's true, and also it is why the 40 other plain citizen honeymooners here at Hot Springs no longer envy Mr. and Mrs. Wilson.

At first they did; you could see it with half an eye! New little wives began to doubt they had caught the most wonderful man in the world when the great president arrived. Proud young husbands looked longingly on the man so important their dotting brides seemed to forget all about them when he passed.

But this envy soon wore off. For even the brides and grooms began to realize that SLEUTHED, without which a honeymoon is not a honeymoon, was denied the president and the first lady of the land.

SEVEN PICKED MEN ON THE JOB CONSTANTLY Seven picked men have been assigned to "honeymoon duty." This means they never lose sight of the president and Mrs. Wilson for an instant throughout the day, and guard them at night with all the alertness of a first-time sentry in the war zone!

Five guards seem to have been selected for brown; they are as husky as the biggest traffic policeman you ever saw, capable of handling three ordinary men in a scrimmage, and dead-steady with the automatics in their coat pockets.

The other two remained a mystery to the other guests of the Homestead for several days. They were faultlessly clad; after 6 they always appeared in evening clothes. No one could distinguish them from the other guests, save they were better dressed.

After considerable speculation the guests reached the conclusion the two good-looking, well-built young men were the most intimate of the president's bodyguard. It was observed that in a crowd their rigid hands seldom left their pockets. No one needs to be told what those pockets hid.

CAMERA MEN TREATED LIKE OUTLAWS Usually the president has a bodyguard of five. For the honeymoon the number was increased by two sleuths, one from Cleveland, one from Pittsburgh.

The boss of the honeymoon squad is the camera man. The newspaper correspondents, here with orders to trail the president wherever he goes, have a certain standing with the detectives. They know the rules of the game and obey them. But the snapshot artist knows no ethics, and the secret service men treat him like an outlaw.

Whenever the president and his wife motor, their machine is driven by a secret service man, with another on the front seat beside him.

A second car with never less than three other guards trails as close behind as possible. The door of the car is always off the latch, and the men inside are ready to leap out at the first sight of need.

When Mrs. Wilson returns to Washington, she will be sleuthed no longer. There the president's wife is only guarded on special occasions, but on her trips to New York and other cities the eyes of two secret service men will never leave her throughout the day.

FORD PARTY GETS PERMISSION TO TRAVEL ACROSS GERMANY; MEET AT HAGUE JAN. 12

BY CHARLES P. STEWART COPENHAGEN, Jan. 3.—Germany has granted permission for the Ford peace party to cross Germany en route to The Hague for what probably will be the final conference.

The German consul here will give the party's passports.

The permission to cross German soil eliminates the probability of a wholesale desertion threatened by those who refused to cross the North sea because of the danger of mines.

A special train has been chartered for the peace party, which will leave Copenhagen Friday.

The Hague meeting probably will last only a few days. According to present plans, the trip will permanently and Jan. 12, when members of the party expect to sail for America.

Dr. Aked, who was left behind at Stockholm because of illness, has recovered and is expected to arrive here today.

FORD MEETS BRYAN NEW YORK, Jan. 3.—Neither Henry Ford nor William J. Bryan today would discuss the conference they held immediately upon Ford's arrival here from Europe.

Bryan met Ford on receipt of a telegraphic request for the conference.

They were closeted together for over an hour. Bryan then returned to Washington, D. C.

"The mere discussion of peace is in itself an advantage," Bryan said in reply to a question concerning his opinion of the Ford peace mission.

Ford declared his opinion on the cause of war has materially changed. He had been of the opinion, he said, that bankers and munition manufacturers were responsible.

He returns, he said, with the opinion that the men who do the fighting are mainly responsible for letting those who rule them do their thinking.

"Republicans is no better than monarchies in this respect," he said significantly.

Ford said that, despite reports to the contrary, his party of peace was harmonious when he left, and that all plans originally made are being carried out. He had not intended to accompany the peaceers throughout the trip, he said, and his sickness merely hastened his return a few days.

WARSHIPS IN AEGEAN SEA LONDON, Jan. 3.—Unconfirmed reports today said 30 troop-laden warships had arrived in the Gulf of Orfano, an arm of the Aegean sea.

RUSSIANS TAKE HEIGHTS PETROGRAD, Jan. 3.—Several heights around Zernowitz, Bukovina, have fallen into Russian hands, along with 900 men, 15 officers and some armament, the war office claimed today.

EXPECT MARTIAL LAW LONDON, Jan. 3.—That Greece will declare martial law Jan. 15 was the claim of an Athens paper today, according to press dispatches.

WILSON RETURNS TO WASHINGTON HAVE NARROW ESCAPE IN FIRE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3.—The gravity of the international situation caused by the torpedoing of the *Glengyle*, coming on the heels of the sinking of the *Persia*, caused President Wilson today to determine to cut his vacation short and return here. He will arrive tomorrow morning.

Ernest Wicklund, a paper hanger, 408 Randolph st., his wife and two children, narrowly escaped with their lives when fire and snow early Monday conspired to totally destroy their home.

The loss is \$1,200, partially covered by insurance.

Unknown causes started the fire about 3 o'clock. Owing to the heavy snow, the fire department was unable to reach the blaze before the \$500 house, owned by Frank Atwood, of the Globe Wall Paper Co., and \$800 worth of furniture had been destroyed.

Wicklund and his family awoke barely in time to escape being burned to death and rushed from the flames in their night clothes.

Several hundred dollars' damage was done by a fire in a vacant apartment at 910 Eastlake ave., shortly before midnight. A dozen frightened tenants turned out into the street in scant apparel.

Extra precautions should be taken to guard against a blaze until the streets are clear of snow, was the warning given by Chief Stetson, Monday. The heavy trucks are unable to make much headway, owing to the slippery condition of the streets at this time.

During the year just passed, 744 persons died for every thousand population. The best record previous to that was 8.1 persons per thousand population, made in 1914.

The white streak of a torpedo. Graphic details of the liner's last moments were told here by Leonard Moss, an English survivor.

Survivor Tells Story "There was no panic, and the loss of life was due to two things," he said.

"First, the *Persia* sank in less than six minutes, and, second, most of those aboard were having luncheon at the time. We were making 18 knots when the boom came, followed by a funny crackling sound. It seemed only a second when the big ship began to list.

Boat Spills Human Cargo "Those on deck rushed to the boats, but those on the starboard side were worthless because they listed heavily. People ran up from below. Women and children were crying, but there was no wild scrambling. Everybody was pretty cool.

"The first two boats got away all right, but the next rolled over as she hit the water. There were a lot of women in that one. The first boat tried to pick up those of the overturned boat, but the waves kept bumping the rescuer against the *Persia*, threatening to capsize the lifeboats that had pulled away.

Women Cling to Men "The next two cleared a minute before the *Persia* sank.

"Some of the crew were trying to get over another, but passengers were grouped on the deck. Women clung to men and the children cried. Then the waves broke over the stern, and I was thrown into the water."

The number of survivors reaching here was placed at close to 160, many of whom were Lascar sailors, engineers and a few women. Many suffered from exposure and it is possible the death list will run higher by reason of this.

Many of the women were lightly clad and men were taken from the water without coats.

Warships Seek Bodies Warships and fishing vessels are seeking bodies off Crete, and it is regarded possible that Greek trawlers rescued some in the water.

Chas. H. Grant of Boston was saved, while Edward Rose of Denver left the *Persia* at Gibraltar.
