PRES. BOYNS TO RESIGN OFFICE

Reported He Disagrees With Other Officers of Commercial Club on Consolidation ACTION IS POSTPONED

Because of a disagreement with other officials in the club, President Robert H. Boyns, re-elected recently as head of the Seattle Commercial Club, has tendered his resignation.

The executive board of the club Tuesday night, however, took no action on the resignation, and the matter was deferred until after the question of consolidation with the Commercial Club is finally disposed of.

The election of an executive secretary, a position held by Otto Case in recent years, has also been postponed for at least two weeks, when the club will take up the report of its special committee.

Boyns' resignation was prompted, it is hinted, because of his insistence that there should be immediate consolidation.

At an open meeting of the Commercial Club, Tuesday night, the above program was decided upon. The special committee, which had come in for some criticism by J. F. Cronin and Councilman Erickson for making its report public before submitting it to the club, received a vote of confidence, after several speeches were made. The committee, in its report, urges consolidation on a proper basis.

Thursday noon this committee, with committees of the Merchants' Exchange and the Chamber of Commerce, will meet at the Arctic club luncheon to discuss the matter further.

CONSCRIPTION BATTLE OPENS

LONDON, Jan. 5.—In introducing the government's conscription bill in the house of commons today, Premier Asquith declared England does not plan to draft at this time all men of military age.

"Results of Lord Derby's enlistment campaign show that the cause for general conscription is not yet proven," he declared.

The bill drafts all single men between the ages of 18 and 41, eligible to military service; and also widowers of the same ages without any persons dependent upon them.

Ireland, Asquith announced, is excluded from the provisions of the conscription bill. This step was taken to avoid the opposition of Irish leaders.

The bill exempts bachelors and widowers engaged in "indispensable and special occupations," like making munitions or working on railways. It also eliminates those who are supporting relatives, and those with conscientious scruples against war, such as the Quakers.

Kitchener was expected to introduce the bill in the house of commons.

Sir John Simon's explanation, of his resignation from the cabinet, it was anticipated, would be the signal for attacks on the government measure. He is supposed to have quit because of the compulsory service plans.

After rejecting the suggestions of Lloyd-George and others favoring general conscription, it is understood that Premier Asquith prevented resignations from the cabinet other than Sir John Simon's by means of compromises.

The Derby plan did not meet expectations, Asquith told the house of commons: "The figures are wonderful. Nearly 3,000,000 men signified their willingness to serve their country."

DECIDES LUNDY IS NO CHEATER

Councilman Ira D. Lundy is not a "sharp" driver of automobile bargains.

Lundy might have got all the work of the machine he sold to Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Winchester for \$600, and perhaps a little more, but Judge Lykeman couldn't find any intention to defraud on Lundy's part.

The Winchesters sued Lundy for \$100. They had paid \$400 for the machine already, they said, and considered it was worth no more than \$300. They wanted \$100 back.

It rattled, squeaked and wheezed when they took it out for a spin, they testified. They said they believed Lundy had shown them one car when he made the sale and then delivered another.

Auto experts told the court it was their opinion that a piece of the machinery had broken loose and was rattling about inside the works.

Anyhow, Lundy wasn't proved a black-hearted rascal.

FIVE IN RACE NOW FOR CITY COUNSEL

Hugh M. Caldwell, formerly chief deputy prosecuting attorney, is the latest entry in the race for corporation counsel, bringing the total to date to five. The other candidates are, in the order of their filing, Thomas F. Murphy, Frank S. Griffith, Jas. E. Bradford, and E. H. Guise.

At a meeting held by leading members of the Young Men's Republican club Monday, an effort was made to center upon just one republican candidate. The names of Griffith, Guise, Caldwell and O. P. Willett were considered. Guise refused, declaring that it would be a violation of the non-partisan spirit demanded in the city charter. None of the candidates were present at the meeting, but some were represented by close friends.

Frank Griffith Wednesday issued a statement denying a rumor that he has agreed to withdraw in favor of a certain other candidate. "I am in the race to the finish," he said.

In their retirement the Austrians were said to have blown up two of the Pruth bridges.
