'CHASING THE CHAMP'
AS TOLD BY FRED FULTON CHAMPIONSHIP CONTENDER
The Story of a Boxer's Rise

Rochester, Minn., the place I call home, was on the map long before my pugilistic ambitions were seriously considered because of the surgical deeds of the Mayo brothers, but I hope to bring the city more fame.

Rochester people never turned me down in the days when I was broke and hungry. Those are things man never forgets.

In Rochester I took up the plastering trade. My size made it easy for me to get work. I seldom had to use a ladder. I plastered in winters and worked on farms in the summer.

Finally I went to Minneapolis and landed a job as a policeman. They put me out in the "sticks" where it was lonely. The job was all right and paid regular money, but I was always figuring on big things.

I went back to dear old Rochester. I had always read sporting pages and now I decided to take up athletics. I began boxing. I had always been conceited enough to think I was as strong as any one and knew I had a longer reach than any fighter, 84½ inches. I knew my weight, 220 pounds, would help.

I had tried myself out some years previous when my brother and myself were forced to battle about 15 roughnecks in a roadhouse. I recalled then I could hit and hit straight. That was the time I found I could hit hard enough to knock out any man in the world. I spilled ten of those fellows and the others ran.

It takes a lot of patience for a fellow to knuckle down in the boxing game and attend to business. You must lead an absolutely clean life and hold yourself beyond temptation. You have to overcome public opinion because some people think a fighter is tough and ungentlemanly.

Some figure a fighter is swell-headed. If being a fighter is egotism, I wish to be placed on record as having the biggest case of the kind. Egotism is often confidence and the fellow without confidence is like a ship without a rudder.

When I started boxing I didn't know a left hook from a right cross. I only knew that if you hit a man on the chin hard enough he will not get up for some time. But I had the strength and the determination.

When I met the girl who is now my wife, I explained my ambitions to her and she encouraged me. I really entered the ring in the hope of making money enough to buy a home and support a family. I attribute much of my success to my wife and baby. The idea of fighting for a wife and baby is bound to speed up a real man.
