SAYS COUNTY LOST BIG SUM ON PAVING

King county has lost, irrevocably, \$178,000 to \$184,000 in brick paving. It developed Wednesday at a meeting of the county commissioners called to consider new specifications for road construction. F. W. Allen, assistant county engineer, pointed out that by a new monolithic system of paving with brick, a saving could be made of from \$5,000 to \$5,000 per mile. The new system, briefly, is based on the well-known fact that a brick lying flat covers more surface than a brick lying on edge. "Probably most of our roads will be laid with the flat side of the brick up, hereafter," said Commissioner Carrigan. Under the old system it cost an average of \$40,000 a square mile to pave with bricks laid on edge. The county has a trifle over 23 miles of such paving. TACOMA, Feb. 9.—Twelve summer homes at Salmon Beach, near Tacoma, have been destroyed by landslides. No personal injuries have been reported.
