### AMERICAN

In "The Yellow Ticket" the pitiful condition of semi-slavery to which Jews in the czar's land are subjected, is depicted in a dramatic manner, with Clara Kimball Young playing the role of the young girl, who, to reach her relatives, must brand herself a woman of the streets.

### COLISEUM

Theodore Roberts, the popular Lasky star, will be seen heading the new show at the Coliseum Wednesday in the title role of Mark Twain's famous story "Puddin'head Wilson." When Division A was built by the city, it was with the intention of having the use of the downtown street, instead of beginning "nowhere and ending nowhere," but thus far the legal obstacles have not yet been overcome.
