# AMBASSADOR TO AID PRESIDENT

Gerard May Come Home to Take Stump for Wilson.

## TELLS GERMAN SIDE

BERLIN, Feb. 24.—If republicans attack President Wilson's submarine political campaign, Ambassador Gerard may stump the U. S. in support of the executive, it was broadly hinted today.  
He plans to visit America before the June convention, and, if he finds Wilson under fire for his dealings with Germany, he may explain to the country a few things about the submarine controversy, which the people do not know.  
Gerard also expects to urge a tariff at least high enough to shut out cheap products with which he is convinced Europe is preparing to flood the United States after the war.  
He may also advocate a tariff commission, to which the president is already committed.  
In addition to this move, the envoy may explain why Germany thought at the beginning of the submarine controversy that America was "bluffing."  
Gerard tried for some weeks to impress German officials with the seriousness of the situation.  
The then Austrian Ambassador Dumba informed the Vienna foreign office that Secretary Bryan assured him that America would never take strong action against Germany.  
In turn, Vienna informed Berlin of this report and Foreign Secretary Von Jagow told Gerard about it.  
Then, to add to the complications, a man from Illinois with credentials from Bryan, arrived at Berlin, met many officials and assured them that President Wilson was writing the submarine notes for "home consumption."  
Gerard's views as to these moves were given to Colonel House during his visit here as the president's personal envoy.

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# MISS CLAYBURG TO MAKE FIGHT

Won't Come to Seattle Without Putting Up Legal Battle

## POLICE SEEK TWO MEN

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 24.—A strong fight against extradition to Seattle for trial on a blackmailing charge will be made by Miss Isabel Clayburg, it was declared today.  
An application for a writ of habeas corpus has been made, it is understood, before Judge Frank R. Willis next Tuesday.  
At that time Sheriff Cline must appear in court with his prisoner and show cause why she should not be released.  
The fight is also being carried to Sacramento. The girl's attorneys have communicated with Gov. Johnson's office, announcing their desire for a hearing on the extradition matter.

When the officer arrives from Seattle with extradition papers, he may have to participate in a lengthy legal battle to prove there are grounds for believing the woman a guilty before the governor sanctions her removal North.  
Police are looking for another young woman who is wanted as a witness. She disappeared just after Miss Clayburg was arrested.  
Two men, who vanished just after the arrest, are also sought.  
Officers searched their apartments and found wearing apparel scattered around, but no sign of them.  
Miss Clayburg says she does not know them, but she is sure she does not know them.

Altho Miss Clayburg is not making any more statements, her attorneys frequently call attention to her original statement just after her arrest, in which she said she was absolutely innocent.

## SILK CLOTH MAY BE MADE FROM BANANA

RIO DE JANEIRO, Feb. 24.—Interest has been aroused in commercial circles in this city over the announcement of the invention of a method of manufacturing artificial silk from the fibers of the banana plant. The invention consists of a chemical treatment of the banana palm in such a manner that the plant fiber is reduced to a gum, from which is spun a fine, elastic, resistant floss that has all the qualities of natural silk.
