## PAULY SPIKES HIRAM GILL LIE

Hotel Liberty Manager Denies Charge of 50-Cents-a-Day Labor

### HE SHOWS MAYOR UP

Henry Pauly, manager last winter of the Hotel Liberty, where several hundred jobs were housed and fed, today nailed the lie circulated by Mayor Gill against Austin E. Griffiths.

In his speeches Gill made the infamous accusation that Griffiths hired men at 50 cents a day from the Hotel Liberty.

Pauly nails the lie definitely. He further shows up Gill's attitude as against paying the men at the Hotel Liberty even one cent a day. His letter follows:

Gill lies when he says Mr. Griffiths worked men for 50 cents a day on his farm. The Hotel Liberty contracted to surface clear, cut all fire wood into 4-foot body wood, and all the cedar into fence posts.

Mr. Griffiths accepted our own price for this work.

At the time we were clearing Mr. Griffiths acreage, we from the Hotel Liberty also had a crew of men working on the county road for King county, paying off the appropriation made by the county commissioners for the support of the Hotel Liberty.

These men were led off of the Griffiths job, and this enabled us to pay back to the county from \$1,700 to \$1,800. It was getting toward spring, and work was opening up. I insisted that the Social Agency committee should pay the men 50 cents a day while they were on that they could accumulate a few dollars for a "get-away" stake.

This work done on Mr. Griffiths' farm was under the jurisdiction of the Central Council of Social Agency unemployed committee, and done under my supervision.

It was the best paying job for the Hotel Liberty we had during the winter of 1914-1915.

Mr. Gill last summer, at the state conference of Charities and Corrections, took exception in his speech to the conference to the 50 cents a day we paid the men at the Hotel Liberty.

He made the remark that these drunken bums who went to the Hotel Liberty to get their food, should receive a meal costing no more than 3 or 4 cents, and should be in some camp outside of the city, where they could scrub shows with the decent citizens of Seattle.

I took exception to Mr. Gill's statement at the conference at that time, of which there is a record in the hands of Rev. J. M. C. A. and which was recorded in the conference. There is also a record of his speech in the Union Record at the Labor Temple.

## MAYOR GILL GETS HIS FOOT INTO IT AGAIN

campaign was on to raise \$150,000 to bring conventions to Seattle.

Regardless of the fact that Griffiths has not been connected with the council during Gill's entire term of office, Gill poured out volleys after volleys on Griffiths' head, blaming him for every imaginable financial trouble in the city.

Denies He Attacked Women He denied he had attacked any woman in this campaign.

He claimed he reduced expenses \$11,000 a month by cutting off the payroll of 50 rat catchers and 12 sanitary inspectors.

"The reason I appointed Griffiths chief," Gill said, "was that I knew he was wealthy, and that he would not be tempted as some men might be.

He claimed he gave Griffiths a free hand to run the department as he saw fit.

Gill charged Griffiths had called him a "thief and a grafter."

Called Him Millionaire "I offended him in another respect," Gill said, "when I said that bonds should be refunded. Griffiths said we ought to pay them up. He wrote an article, saying Gill is crazy and we ought to pay our debts. Certainly, we shall pay our debts. However, I never heard of Griffiths doing anything to pay off the debts of the city."

Gill again stated that he knew Griffiths is a millionaire, that he owns two blocks of land on Capitol hill, and thousands upon thousands of acres of land in Lewis county.

Accuses Mrs. Charter Gill then said his compliments to Mrs. Charter.

"What a chance for a noble, patriotic woman to help the city of her birth," he said, "by soothing the fevered brow of some London boy who have fallen fighting instead of slithering over an unfortunate in a foreign country."

Then addressing himself particularly to Ballard voters, Gill said: "I want the votes of Ballard if I can get them. What did Griffiths ever do for Ballard? Look at Division A. Has he connected and extended that line to Ballard?"

In a statement by Griffiths today, he points out that he was not in the city council when the extension of Division A to Ballard came up, but Gill was mayor then, and GILL VIOLENTLY OPPOSED SUCH EXTENSION.

"Griffiths says he will save a million a year," Gill said. "How? Will he cut out the double platoon in the fire department? I am strong for that system. Will he cut down the wages of employees?"

In 1912, Griffiths spoke for and worked in behalf of the double platoon, while Gill never uttered a word in its behalf.

While in the council, Griffiths voted to raise the salary of only six employees who were getting under \$100 a month, and he opposed a raise in salaries of those getting over that amount.

"I did not know so much about Mr. Griffiths," Gill said, "until he got out of the police department. Since he left, we have been running the stockade and jail at \$300 a month less.

It appears that his principal ambition in quitting as chief was to hook a knife under my ribs."

## 2 WOMEN DEAD, 85 PERSONS INJURED, IN AN EXPLOSION

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 29.—The first reports had placed the dead at 20 and the injured at 100, investigation today indicated two women perished and 85 persons were injured in a dynamite blast at Maplewood suburb late yesterday. Several houses were wrecked.

The blast was due to a fire in dynamite stored for sewer excavation work.

## SAYS DIVORCE COURT CAN'T THRIVE ON COLLEGE GIRLS

Divorce courts would have cobwebs on the doors if their business depended only on straightening out matches made in college class room.

That is the contention of Miss Ethel Hunley Caldwell, dean of women at the state university, who spoke before the Seattle Federation of Women's clubs Monday afternoon.

"Since education is for personal life and not for sex, there should be the same training for women as for men in liberal arts," she said. "We have come to realize that the best protection for entering the world of industry is education."

A girl should be unfit for idleness, she said, after receiving an education.

Josephine Preston, state superintendent of public instruction, explained the state land grant provision and the educational survey plans.

## BEAT HANNA BILL

The Hanna billboard ordinance was voted down by the city council again Monday.

Five councilmen voted to pass it over the mayor's veto, but six votes were necessary. Those who voted against the measure were, Bolton, Fitzgerald, Haas and Hesketh. The Hanna bill was supported by Marble, Erickson, Dale, Lundy and Hanna.

If passed, it would impose a square foot tax on the industry and provide detailed regulations. The concealed weapons ordinance, making a permit necessary from the police chief before purchasing small arms and taxing all dealers, was passed over the mayor's veto. Fitzgerald and Hesketh opposed it.

Councilman Erickson introduced a bill calling for quarterly statements of revenues and expenses from the city light, water and public utilities departments.
