

THE MAN ON THE JOB
Meet Newt Baker, Our New War Boss

CLEVELAND, O., March 11.—What sort of a man is Newton Baker, familiarly called "Newt" by folk in this city, who, as the new secretary of war, is going to handle the Villa situation. Well, he is an inveterate pipe smoker, for one thing. By his pipe you may know him—and by his poker face—inscrutable, unchanging, expressionless. Behind his poker face is a clear, analytical mind—the type of mind that gets where it starts for, without fuss and seemingly without effort. When he heard he had been named to succeed Garrison, he only said: "You may say for me that there is nothing I may say." That settled it. "I'm gaining weight," he added. He had relinquished Cleveland's mayoralty a brief two months before, and had settled down to practicing law, waiting for something to skyrocket him back into public limelight. That's Baker's fate. They won't let him be a private citizen. In the early '90s he was attending college at Johns Hopkins, Baltimore. He went bareheaded all winter. He got his B. A. from Johns Hopkins in 1892, and an LL. B. from Washington and Lee in '94. In 1897 he moved to Cleveland. Tom Johnson was rising in politics. Baker tied up to Tom, and rose, too. He became assistant city solicitor in 1903, and then was elected solicitor three times. In 1911 Cleveland made him mayor by the biggest majority in history. In 1913 he repeated. In 1915 he refused to run. At midnight of leap year he became a private citizen again—for two months. But Baker's rise was not without a struggle. He fought long—and loud—for three-cent fares. Cleveland has 'em. He won home rule for Ohio cities. He helped win a city-owned light plant. There's little color in his face, but there's lots in his career. As a phrase-maker, he's not after Roosevelt's laurels. "Cold as ice," opponents call him. "Cold as steel," his friends amend. He's 45—born in Martinsburg, W. Va., in 1871. He married Elizabeth Leopold of Pottstown, Pa., in 1903. They have three children—Betty (10), Jack (9), Margaret (4). Mrs. Baker is a suffragist, and a member of the Consumers' league.


