OUTLINES PLANS OF THE KAISER

Chancellor Tells Reichstag No American Aggression Is Intended

OUTLINES WAR PLANS

BERLIN, April 5.—In the most comprehensive speech of the war, delivered before a crowded reichstag, Imperial Chancellor Von Bethmann-Hollweg today reviewed military and political situations, the means of conducting further warfare, and German relations with the United States.

Von Bethmann-Hollweg vigorously protested against reports that Germany contemplates present or future aggressive action against the United States.

"The last offspring of the campaign of calumnies against us is the report that, after the end of the war, we will rush against the American continent and attempt to conquer Canada as our first province," said Hollweg.

"This is the silliest of all the imputations invented against us. "Those are equally silly reports that we have contemplated acquisition of any territory on American soil, either in Brazil or in any American country whatsoever."

"A spirit of union shall lead us," he said, as his speech was concluded amid great cheering, "and it shall lead our children and grandchildren thru their struggles toward a future of strength and liberty."

To Continue "Warfare Germany," declared the chancellor, will vigorously continue its submarine activities. In this way it will fight the British attempt to starve the Central Powers.

After having reviewed Germany's victories, Hollweg said his country would never willingly consent to return Poland or other conquered Russian provinces to the czar.

He contemplated the formation after the war of a new Belgium, in which the rights of Flemish speaking people who sprang from German stock would receive fullest consideration.

Cannot Starve Germany It was folly, he asserted, for the allies to talk about starving Germany and Austria into submission. In this connection, he called attention to the coming crops which, he said, were most promising.

"Since I last addressed you," said the chancellor, "our enemies' enterprise at the Dardanelles has failed."

Outlines Situation "With our Bulgarian and Austrian allies, we have brought the Serbian campaign to a victorious end. "Montenegro and Albania are likewise in the hands of our allies. The British have vainly tried to relieve their beleaguered forces at Kut-el-Amara."

"Russians occupy Erzerum with superior forces, but wrong armies of our Turkish allies checked further advances."

"Russian attacks against Austrians in Eastern Galicia, and Italian troops who are on the snow-capped mountains of the Alps, have been beaten back."

Discusses Verdun Operations "The Russian columns broke down before Field Marshal Von Hindenburg and his heroes. The enemy's position is a desperate one, as our victories at Verdun prove."

"Operations there were prepared with profound foresight, and the bravery of the Germans continues to gain advantage for us."

"His Answer—The Sword" "The allies' response to my offer to discuss terms of peace was a demand that Germany's military power be crushed."

"To these peace conditions only one answer is left—this must be given by our sword."

"We will have to face it out like men."

MUNICIPAL LEAGUE JOINS IN FIGHT FOR EQUAL R. R. RATES

By unanimous vote, the Municipal league is now on record against the differential rate maintained by the Southern Pacific railroads against Pacific Northwest points in the tourist trade, which has resulted in keeping out of Seattle thousands of tourists every year and diverting them to California instead.

This fight was begun several months ago by Chairman C. A. Reynolds of the state public service commission, with the cooperation of The Star, and has developed to such an extent that the commercial bodies, one after the other, and other newspapers have joined in.

CHAMBER WILL VOTE

Relinquishment of the Philippine Islands and establishing them as an independent government is considered inopportune at this time by the national affairs committee of the Chamber of Commerce. A memorial to congress to this effect was referred to a vote of the entire membership. The memorial was submitted to the trustees Tuesday afternoon, and, on motion of D. E. Frederick, a referendum vote of the members will be taken on it.
