Dead Fingers Clapsed About Revolver

This weapon had been placed in the dead man's hand and the fingers clapsed tightly about it, but the other indications so strongly pointed to murder that the ruse failed of its evident purpose.

Seattle was unused to such crimes of violence and the thriving young city was electrified when the newspapers printed the gruesome story.

Chronicler Stuart was summoned and hastily called a jury, which reached the following verdict at 2 o'clock of the same day:

"We, the undersigned jury, are agreed that the unknown man came to his death by unknown hands."

The verdict was signed by Charles Love, foreman, Stephen Niblock, James Bridges, William Kwoeler, S. Thompson and G. Whittely.

Immediately Police Chief Monroe set his detectives to work out the mystery.

The two young hunters and Clarence Emery, a bartender at Beede's pavilion, were examined closely, the body was searched and the scene of the crime gone over, but nothing developed to throw any light on the identity of the murdered man or lend a clue towards running down his assailant.

The body was taken to Bonney & Stewart's undertaking parlors, and through that and the following day, 2,000 people called to view it in the hope of establishing its identity.

At last the late Otto Ranke, a brick manufacturer, positively named the remains as those of Oluf Ellingson, a cook, who had been working up to the Saturday prior at James Field's scow camp in West Seattle.

Ranke's men boarded at Field's camp.

A number of men had recently quit the camp, among them Nelson Hanson, Gustave Erickson, Tony Miller and Charles Lindberg.

Ellingson had drawn \$600 in back pay when he left.

No money had been found in his clothing when he was arrested. Detectives found the lodgings of Ellingson at the West Seattle house at the foot of Columbia st.

Ellingson had long hair when he arrived in the city and had gone to the West Street barber shop to be shorn by Barber Monroe.

Monroe gave out a statement when questioned closely that threw suspicion on Hanson, Erickson, Miller and Lindberg.

While he was clipping Ellingson's hair, he said, on the Wednesday prior, his patron told him he and a party of friends were going out to Lake Washington.

The friends were waiting on the sidewalk outside. Monroe had noticed them and gave the detectives a good description.

It was learned later that such a party had gone to Lake Washington on the Madison street car.

Officer James Young arrested Hanson, Erickson and Lindberg on Saturday following.

Miller was not found, nor never has been.

Suspicion also fell on several others. Robert Burke, who had been arrested the week before, at about the time of the murder, for stealing \$10 from the bartender of a waterfront saloon, was found to be carrying a concealed revolver when searched at the station.

The revolver was covered with blood, and its hammer fitted the three dents in Ellingson's skull.

On Thursday afternoon Stanley Field had walked into the station and said he had been accidentally shot while hunting on Lake Washington. His right leg was wounded, and Chief Monroe sent him to Providence hospital to recuperate and to be held for later investigation.

It was about the time the police offered \$200 reward for the capture of Tony Miller that a Mrs. Scott, who lived at Drexel ave. and California st., went to the police station and made a report that changed the entire aspect of the case.

Circumstances looked bad for Miller, however.

It was definitely learned that he was in the party with Ellingson on the southbound car between 9 and 11 a. m. on the last day Ellingson was seen, and that Miller returned alone about 3 o'clock that afternoon.

He was seen on the waterfront that night, and there the trail ended.

Woman Gives Police New Lead

Mrs. Scott's story proved to be the most peculiar feature of the entire case.

On the same day the murder was supposedly committed, Mrs. Scott said she saw two men between Madison and Yesler way, a short distance from where the body was found.

They were flushed and perspiring, she said, and stopped at her house and asked for a drink of water. She turned into the house to bring the dipper, when the largest of the two suddenly detailed her, saying they would drink from a tub of rain water standing outside.

They said they were in a hurry and could wait no longer.

Taking a draught from the tub, they ran into the brush and disappeared, she said, before she had noted that the larger man's right coat sleeve had been freshly torn.

The police were mystified by this new evidence and made a thoro investigation.

Suspected Men Give Town a Laugh

They learned that the same two men had stopped at a fish dealer's near Beede's pavilion, and asked him for a pair of scissors.

When he gave them the desired article, the shorter cut the larger man's whiskers off close to his face.

Search for the two men began at once. The city was combed.

A day or two later a prize fighter, named Tebeau, and his trainer, Cuffey, gave themselves up to the police as the men Mrs. Scott had described.

They had been training the day of the murder, they said, and had stopped near Mrs. Scott's home to spar and wrestle after a long run across country. In wrestling Tebeau's coat sleeve had been ripped by Cuffey, they explained, and the fighter had cut his whiskers off because they bothered him.

This remarkable confession caused a hearty laugh over the entire city, but left unsolved the murder of Oluf Ellingson.

On Sunday another clue was found.

Cuff Links Fasten Crime on Miller

Thomas Kehoe, who had made a careful search of the brush for some distance around the spot where Ellingson's body lay, discovered a pair of cuffs that had been hidden beneath a log.

They were covered with blood! He carried them to Capt. John A. Barck, present Bertillon operator, who was then a detective.

Barck looked them over carefully and found a fairly distinct laundry mark. Here was the clue, he felt, to the murderer.

He carried them from one laundry to another, inquiring at each whose mark it was that appeared on the bloody cuffs.

At last he learned, and altho the man whose mark it was has never been found and is believed to have left the United States with Ellingson's \$600, Capt. Barck is confident he solved the most hideous mystery of Madison park.

The mark on the cuffs was that of Tony Miller!
