


Suquamish Sale Great Success

KOKLOK LEARNS FINE NEW GAME

How Alaska Bureau of Education Is Helping Eskimo

HAS MONEY IN BANK

NOME, Alaska, April 17.—Koklok, mighty Eskimo hunter of Point Barrow, is learning a fascinating new game. He is making money grow more money. White men call it banking. And it's a fine game, thinks Koklok.

Koklok is a frugal man. By trading many fox skins and a lynx or two he got a rifle. With it he slew more fox, white and red.

Traders from the Southland gave him two, three, maybe five dollars for the white pelts; less for the red. By going hungry often and occasionally robbing the dogs of their smoked salmon rations, the Eskimo and his family managed to get thru the long winters without starving. It had always been thus, and Koklok, an Arctic philosopher, did not complain.

His children, the soft, whimpering tenderlings—they, too, would become philosophers as they grew older and became more used to hunger.

Koklok was one of the problems confronting the Alaska bureau of education—he and thousands of other natives in the Northland.

At its head the bureau has a wise man, Supt. William Lopp.

How to help Koklok get better prices for his furs and walrus ivory seemed to Lopp of tremendous importance.

It would keep those babies plump, for one thing.

He arranged that the natives could send their furs to Seattle to be marketed under the supervision of the bureau.

Koklok's skepticism was banished when thru this channel he received \$20 a pelt for his white fox, as against the maximum \$5 of the white traders.

There was excitement and laughter, and a neighborhood row-work in the squallid little shack when Koklok got his money.

Now hunting had a new zest. There was plenty to eat.

By and by Koklok, who was making money now, got another message.

Leave some of your money where you do not need with us," suggested Lopp, in whom the natives had great confidence. "We will put it in the bank to your credit. It will draw interest. Your money will grow into more money."

How that could be Koklok didn't quite understand.

Perhaps he doesn't fully understand it yet.

But he has several hundred dollars in a Seattle bank.

When traders come to Point Barrow offering \$5 for white fox skins Koklok smiles in his new wisdom.

The trader either pays him somewhere near the prevailing market price for furs or departs empty-handed.

And Koklok writes checks on his Seattle bank when he pays a bill or purchases supplies from the white man's stores.

Many other natives are following his example.

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BILLINGSLEY ARRESTED ON WEST VIRGINIA WARRANT

Logan Billingsley, one of three brothers connected with the Stewart Street pharmacy, was in the county jail Sunday night until 2 a. m. Monday as a fugitive from West Virginia, where he is said to be wanted to answer to a charge of murderous assault.

At the Police Judge Gordon had fixed Billingsley's bail at \$3,500, Sheriff Dodge released the prisoner at 2 o'clock on the personal recognizance of Attorney George Vanderveer.

He did not know bail had been demanded.

According to C. T. Townsend, prosecuting attorney at Charleston, W. Va., the druggist is under indictment with Grant Edens and Bert Silman for assault upon Chas. Oliver, who was stabbed and shot nearly to death on April 1, 1915.

"Very anxious to apprehend Billingsley," read Townsend's telegram. "Requisition papers ready, and man will start for him at once. Take no chances with him."

Billingsley's youngest brother, Sherman, was acquitted last week of selling liquor without a prescription at the Stewart Street drug store, a place that has afforded the police much trouble.


HONOR MRS. BLATCH

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GOVERNMENT TO DEVELOP POWER

This Is Provided in New Bill by Representative Tavenner

WASHINGTON, April 17.—Government development of water-power resources, and the sale of power at cost of reduction to counties, cities, corporations, and individual users, is the solution of the water-power problem proposed in a bill introduced in the house of representatives today by Representative Clyde H. Tavenner of Illinois.

The fight between the conservation and anti-conservation forces in congress over the control of government-owned water resources, resulting in the passage through the house of the bill, which fails to protect public interests, is responsible for the new Tavenner bill.

The Tavenner bill creates a "Water Development Board" consisting of the secretaries of war, interior and agriculture. It reserves all rights of the United States in or over navigable streams and their tributaries and on the public lands and reservations, including national parks and national forests.

The bill follows closely the lines of the Reclamation act, creating in the treasury a special fund to be known as the "waterpower development fund" to consist of an initial amount of \$50,000,000, which the secretary of the treasury is directed to place in the fund. This amount is to be raised by a three per cent bond issue.

Cheaper War Munitions
The rates to users of power are to be fixed by the board at such figure as will produce revenue to maintain and operate the plant. The bill is designed not only to furnish cheap power to consumers all over the United States, but to provide the government with power for its own uses, such as the construction of nitrate plants which would be necessary in war time to manufacture powder, and which could be used in peace to produce fertilizer. Cheap power would determine also the location of munitions manufacturing plants run by the government.
