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NEW CHIEF GIVES CLEAN-UP ORDERS

According to the announcement made by Chief Beckingham Monday, and proprietors must not think that one fruitless raid will prejudice officers against making second calls.

Saturday night a special squad, directed by Sgt. Fred Smart, went to Gerald's cafe on First ave. and searched it from kitchen to cash register for a trace of liquor.

Officers and plain clothes men were stationed in the vicinity of Gerald's cafe Sunday night and ordered to keep a vigilant lookout for liquor buyers.

They reported to the chief that they hadn't seen any.

Sgt. V. R. Putnam has been assigned to special detail work under the chief, because Beckingham says "He's a go-getter."

None was found.

In the meantime various ways of clamping down the lid are being figured out by Prosecutor Lundin, Deputy Prosecutor Patterson, Mayor Gill, Anti-Saloon leaguers and Chief Beckingham.

Prosecutor Lundin is working with the State Board of Pharmacy representatives, and says they have promised to help him war on the dishonest prescription traffic.

Deputies have started to examine the prescription records of ev-

ery drug store in the city, and the prosecuting attorney says that he will go after the doctors who have issued them too freely.

Mayor Gill and President Kirkpatrick of the Anti-Saloon league have conferred on proposed city legislation that may strengthen law enforcement against bootlegging, and the council will be asked to get busy.

What they want to see done is: Limit amount of liquor drug stores can carry.

Have druggists file weekly prescription list.

Direct city attorney to check up on liquor stocks.

Have druggists get city permits every time they import liquor.

Direct city comptroller not to issue permits until liquor stock inventory of amount on hand has been filed.

Chief of police to issue permits for purchase of alcohol or mechanical purposes.

Make it unlawful to carry any liquor into cafe.

Make it a misdemeanor to purchase liquor except by prescription.

The amendments for the liquor ordinance will be drawn up by Corporation Counsel Caldwell and representatives of the Anti-Saloon league and returned to Mayor Gill in about a week, Gill said Monday.

"I'll take the matter up with the city council then," the mayor said, "and ask for immediate action."
