Tacoma Prepares for Big Drive in Town's Fight to "Lift the Curse" Off Mountain

TACOMA, April 19.—Tacoma is preparing for her last big drive to change the name of Mount Rainier. At a mass meeting held Tuesday night, at the Commercial Club, representatives of every civic organization got together and outlined the campaign. It was called by the "Justice to the Mountain" club. A committee of 15 members was appointed. They will go to Seattle and hold conferences, prior to going before the governor, and asking that a geographic board be named to take the matter up at Washington. Government officials have assured them that a recommendation from such a state board would be accepted by the government, and that the Indian name of the mountain would be officially returned.

CORONER MASON, ACTING AS SHERIFF, SLIPS UP ON THE JOB

While Coroner Mason, as ex-officio sheriff, still holds a court order detaining the codfishing schooner Fortuna in port here Wednesday, the vessel is swiftly stepping off miles and miles of high seas bound for the Far North. Acting for Sheriff Hodge, the coroner detailed F. L. Meers, of 1013 East John st., to watch the schooner as she lay at dock Tuesday. Proceedings to attach the vessel were well under way in court when Meers stepped off the dock to the dock for a moment. At this very moment the tug Wanderer slipped up, threw a tow line aboard the schooner and dragged her out into the bay and off to open water. Coroner Mason, Deputy Coroner McDonald and Patrolmen Guterman and Pendergast gave chase in the police boat, while the Fortuna vanished into the distance laden with a cargo of salt and supplies for Alaska fisheries.

Hubert Kittle and Frank Edmondson, officers, and Jack O'Connell, pilot, are the missing ones. The trip had intended to attempt to break the world's record for a parachute drop. Kittle planned to step from the basket at a height of 15,000 feet.
