ROOSEVELT MAY TAKE THE STUMP

OYSTER BAY, April 22.—Col. Roosevelt may reconsider his plans not to stump the Middle West before the national convention, it was hinted today.

He has not yet accepted the invitation to deliver the Memorial day address at Kansas City, but it is likely he will do so.

Should a whirlwind tour of Iowa, Nebraska and other states revive the old Roosevelt demonstrations, the colonel might enter Chicago at a dramatic moment when the stage is set for the choice of a republican-progressive leader his friends say.

Roosevelt would not comment on Henry Ford's showing in Nebraska, which some interpret as proof that the Middle West is against preparedness.

SEATTLE MAN JOINS ALLIES AT FRONT

WESTMINSTER, April 22.—W. E. Malden, rough rider captain and later Seattle newspaperman, who participated in the Harry Tracy headstump hunt, has enlisted in the 121st Westminister battalion machine gun section, for duty in France. He left the news editorship of the British Columbian to see service. His son, Harold Malden, is already in the trenches.

STANFORD WINS OAKLAND RACE

OAKLAND, April 22.—Stanford's varsity crew defeated the University of California oarsmen in their annual race on Oakland estuary today. A huge crowd cheered the eight at the finish.

The crews got away to a perfect start and pulled neck and neck over the first mile. After the first mile had been passed Stanford's strength began to show and the Cardinal tipped oars forged steadily into the lead, gaining at every stroke.

Coxswain Camper of the Bears yelled for more speed and the California eight rallied bravely, but Clune and Hardy of the State university crew were obviously in distress and not doing their best.

As they swept into the third and final mile, Stanford let out a few blasts and whipped up its stroke. The Cardinals rowed like machines.

They were pulling at top form, just as they did at Poughkeepsie last year.

California's crew, the best in the school's history, did its best, but it was outwored.

Stanford surged past the judges' boat at the finish six or more lengths ahead, every man fresh and pulling strong.

COMMANDER OF TURK ARMY DEAD

LONDON, April 22.—The death of Field Marshal Von Der Goltz, commander-in-chief of the first Turkish army, and supervisor of the sultan's military establishment, is a severe blow to Turkey. Berlin announced he died of spotted fever at Turkish headquarters. He was ill 10 days.

Many regarded him as Germany's greatest soldier, despite the reverse the Turks suffered after he had reconstructed their army.

Von Der Goltz personally was a bluff man, fearing no superiors. He was not a favorite of the kaiser.

Soon after the war started he served for a short time as military governor of Belgium.

SPOKANE, April 22.—Henry Suzzallo, president of the University of Washington, was elected president of the Inland Empire Teachers' association here Friday night.

ARRESTED FOR ARSON

BELLINGHAM, April 22.—Joe Swartz, alias Joe Black, proprietor of the French Dye Works here, was arrested yesterday on information from San Jose, Cal., where he is under indictment, charged with arson.

While Swartz has been in business here, two fires have taken place on his premises, one in his shop, the other at his home. Both placed were covered by \$500 insurance.

HOLDS UP TRAIN AS PER PROMISE

RAWLINS, Wyo., April 22.—Following a hold train robbery, several posses today scoured the hills near here for an unmasked bandit with a price of \$6,500 on his head.

Fulfilling a threat he caused to be published in newspapers recently, the robber boarded the Union Pacific California Limited, mingled with the passengers for hours, then disarmed a special detective and forced him to pass the hat in the observation car and one Pullman.

He observed the same chivalry toward women that featured his two previous Union Pacific hold-ups since February. He gave the defective a souvenir pin and a gold watch, proceeds of another robbery, saying he would give away one of the watches taken last night at his next robbery.

The loot included valuables and cash stolen from 40 men.

NO TRUST IN OATS
