WOULD YOU LET PATIENT DIE TO END SUFFERING?
To save human life is a wonderful privilege. But if you were a physician, would you save the life of the woman you loved if it would mean that she must then go thru life hopelessly insane?
This is the strange, heart-breaking problem which confronts Dr. Neighbour, in the play of that name, at the Alhambra theatre. He had withheld his own feelings when the girl, his ward, fell in love with a young man, who proved unworthy. Then came the tragic time when she was hurt in an auto accident. In her pain and suffering, she pleads for a quick death. Dr. Neighbour refuses to end her sufferings. A nurse, a close friend of the girl, however, administers the fatal overdose of morphine.

REPUBLICANS STICK TO "ABE"

"Point With Pride" to Lincoln; Nobody Mentions Roosevelt

SELECTS DELEGATES

With no break in the set program, the King county republican convention did everything just as expected Saturday.
Following the election of W. A. Peters as temporary chairman, Judge H. E. Hadley was chosen permanent chairman.
Both "keynoted" and delivered the expected roasts of the democratic party.
The convention also adopted the usual kind of platform, "looking with alarm" at the democratic office holders, and "pointing with pride" to Abraham Lincoln and the past glories of the republican party.
The day passed without any one daring to mention T. R. Taft, or any of the other modern republican leaders.

As expected, the platform was silent on the bores question, and endorsed national woman suffrage, preparedness, a constitutional convention, better Alaska legislation and lower taxes.
The platform endorsed the principle of nonpartisanship as to a new election and rapped non-partisanship as to the election of state and county officers.
It rapped Gov. Lister for failing to provide a state powder factory.
Probably the biggest surprise in the platform was a clause pledging the legislature to enact amendments to the workmen's compensation act, "to bring about more just compensation" to injured workmen.
It is silent as to a "first aid" provision.
The last legislature is endorsed, as are also Congressmen Humphrey and Lin H. Bayne.

The convention selected 148 delegates to the state convention at North Yakima Saturday. A caucus of the delegation will be held Wednesday evening.

WILSON GETTING VERY IMPATIENT

WASHINGTON, May 1.—Light will possibly be thrown on the German-American situation here tonight. A long dispatch from Ambassador Gerard, outlining his conference with the Kaiser, is reported en route.
It is believed this will also clear up what Germany proposed with respect to meeting the United States' demand.
It is believed that President Wilson will not wait longer than next Saturday for a reply to his demands.

Unless there is early evidence that a note from Germany is forthcoming, it is believed likely the president will suggest to Ambassador Gerard that time is up.

THEY'RE FOR HUGHES

William A. Gilmore, former senator of New York and one of Alaska's two delegates to the republican national convention in Chicago, who is now in Seattle, said Monday that Alaska republicans are for Hughes as a candidate for president.
He said that a resolution asking that delegates be instructed to elect Hughes was voted down at the territorial convention.
"Hughes is the only man that can unite all the factions of the party and gain victory over Wilson," said Gilmore.

A.—Shades of lavender, purple, gray, and black and white.

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
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Our Police Department

How the Law Can Be Enforced

There are many reasons why our police judges should be elected by vote of the people. He appoints the municipal judges beyond the influence that may balance the scales of justice. He also removes from the executive power a responsibility that should not be placed on a city chief executive. A judge elected by the people becomes responsible to the people, while one appointed by the mayor is, of necessity, responsible to the mayor. If Seattle elected its chief of police and police judge, they would both look to the law as a guide to official duty. At the present time the mayor has the duty of appointing and we have seen it come up again that a mayor controlled the chief of police and police judge and set the law aside.
It is not fair that a mayor be held responsible for the acts of officials whose duty is defined by law, and again the chief executive of a great city has enough to do without having to give time and attention to matters outside of executive duty. This "boy play" of officials in Washington has been going on for years and the other fellow should come to an end.
We now have a benevolent autocracy in Seattle. The mayor is chief executive (mayor), also the head of the police department. He appoints the chief or removes him at will. He also controls or destroys the legislative power of the council by the veto power, and the mayor appoints the judge of the municipal court. The mayor makes the law, executes the law and adjudicates the law. He is the autocrat. Of course, with Mr. Gill in office it is not so bad as it might be. 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
