## WOMAN JUDGE TELLS OF NEEDED CHANGES IN LAW FOR THE HOME

**SOME THINGS JUDGE WHITEHEAD WOULD DO**  
Amend the "Lazy Husband" law to provide support for fatherless children.  
Provide legislation necessary to identify the illegitimate father.  
Modify the "Mothers' Pension" law to include pensions for unmarried mothers.  
Establish a home for women police characters, and provide a woman police judge for women's cases.

Even the men folks who smiled at first admit that Judge Reah M. Whitehead, who presided at Monday night's suffrage mass meeting at the Moore, has made good.  
Since January, 1915, Miss Whitehead has sat in her court in the Prefontaine building, hearing her portion of the woes of men and women, adjudicating their troubles and always thinking.

Her thought has been in one direction, not towards the finding of flaws in the present statutes, but along the line of making the good laws better.  
She believes in the "Lazy Husband" law, and at this time is hearing all the cases that come under that law.  
Says Law Falls Short  
But she believes it falls short of its purpose in one respect.  
"Under this law the courts have held that a man who is the father of an illegitimate child (that is, more properly speaking, an illegitimate father) can neither be punished for the non-support of that child nor compelled to support such child," said Judge Whitehead.

"It is claimed that in order to charge an illegitimate father with the maintenance of his child it is necessary that the law in question be amended to include such a parent."  
"In this connection a further enactment, providing for proceedings whereby the fact of his parenthood could be legally established, would, of course, be necessary."  
Would Change Present Law  
Speaking of changes she deems are needed in the "Mothers' Pension" law, Judge Whitehead said: "A mother who has no husband is not apparently within the purview of the law. Its eyes are closed upon her."  
"Again, it may be argued by some, that such a mother is not fit for the bringing up of her child.  
"Without admitting, in any degree, that this argument is sound, attention is directed to the 'Mothers' Pension Act' to the effect that

even in the case of a wedded mother an allowance will be made only on the condition that she is a fit and proper person for the bringing up of her child.

Woman Judge for Women  
"Therefore, the qualification of an unwedded mother could be inquired into, under the law, just as is done in other cases."

Judge Whitehead believes a woman judge should preside over all women's cases in police court. "It is better," she said, "a woman understands a woman better than men do, and the woman prisoner sometimes hesitates to state her case to a man judge."

"I believe that in most cases it is ineffectual to fine the women who come into police court, and it is still worse to send them to jail, where they are penned up in a small room and suppressed."  
"When they are liberated there is little chance that they will do anything but fall back into the old rut."

"To correct this condition we need a reformatory, or home, outside the city, where the influences would be such as to really benefit them, where they could have outdoor exercise, good food and a changed environment."

### G. O. P. Convention Indorses Suffrage

On March 29 the republican convention of Virginia, meeting in Roanoke, passed the following resolution:

"We favor suffrage being extended to women and therefore favor the enactment of all laws necessary to the accomplishment of this end."

A delegation of suffragists addressed the committee prior to the passage of the resolution. Mrs. Dexter Otey spoke for the adoption of the Susan B. Anthony equal suffrage amendment.

### First Women Sit on West Virginia Jury

Ide F. Kootz and Grace Preston, of Morgantown, W. Va., have the distinction of being the first women ever to serve on a jury in West Virginia. They have been chosen by Justice of the Peace S. A. Barker as members of a jury to sit in the case of the death of William Rozell. Finding a scarcity of men, the justice ordered the constable to summon two women.


