### SEATTLE WOMAN FACING ARREST

Warrant issued in San Francisco for Mrs. Harold H. Johnson

OFFICERS SEEK HER  
Word reached Seattle Saturday that Mrs. Harold H. Johnson, prominent in Seattle, and the wife of a former navy officer, is in trouble in San Francisco, where she is charged with running up auto rent bills and hiring servants, then failing to foot the bills.

Two warrants for her arrest have been issued, and San Francisco officers have failed to find her.

It was learned that Mrs. May Searles Johnson, mother of Harold Johnson, took Mrs. Johnson's children to Butte a week ago.

According to reports from San Francisco, young Mrs. Johnson neglected to pay for an auto and a chauffeur she had engaged for several rides. The bill was \$122.

She also is accused of employing a Japanese servant, and forgetting to settle his bill, amounting to \$57. Mrs. Johnson went to San Francisco, in the absence of her husband, who is in Russia for the Electric Boat Co., building naval vessels.

Lieut. and Mrs. Johnson were married in Port Townsend four years ago.

She is the daughter of the late Rev. Henry Ward Beecher, and a sister of Capt. H. S. Beecher of Seattle, manager of the Puget sound interests of the C. C. Moore company.

### TWO PROMINENT MEN DISAPPEAR

PORTLAND, May 6.—The mysterious disappearance of two prominent Clarke county, Washington, men under similar circumstances about the same time, has resulted in a search.

The both have been missing more than two weeks, not the slightest trace of them has been found.

W. R. Canfield, a rancher, left his home to consult a physician in Portland.

After he boarded the ferry at Vancouver he was never seen again by anybody who knew him.

April 19, L. T. VanOver, 53, of Ridgefield, Wash., boarded a steamboat in Portland to return to his home. He has not been seen since. His friends and relatives fear foul play.

### SENTENCE CLINE

Oliver H. Cline, embezzling cashier of the Pacific Coast Co., will leave Seattle in a few days to begin serving a sentence of five to 15 years at Walla Walla.

Before Judge Ronald sentenced him, Friday afternoon, Cline turned over about \$15,000 in cash, bonds and realty to the company for which he worked 17 years as a trusted employe.

He confessed he had stolen \$148,000 in the last decade. He is 42 years old.

### DRYS ASSEMBLE TO FRAME CAMPAIGN

Prohibitionists will center their state political fight on electing congressmen to work for national drouth, according to announcements made Saturday.

E. and 45th st., at the Temple Baptist church Sunday evening, and at the Swedish Methodist church Monday evening. Sizer will talk at the Brighton Presbyterian church Sunday, at 11 a. m.

### ENGLAND IS PEEVED

United Press Staff Correspondent LONDON, May 6.—Dispatches from Washington reporting the probable acceptance of the German submarine note reply by the United States government brought disappointment to Great Britain today.

The morning newspapers published lengthy editorials and agreed almost unanimously that the reply failed to meet the American demands.

The press expressed concern over the attempt to embarrass Great Britain and the United States by making the concession conditional on a change of British methods.

The only paragraph satisfactory to London was Germany's declaration that concessions made would prevent the prolongation of the war.

Critics seized upon this as an admission that Germany is highly alarmed over the possible effects of America's entrance into the war on the side of the allies.

The Post and the Chronicle agreed that Germany was prolonging the negotiations again.

### RENAME CITY HALL


