## BULL MOOSE PARTY LEADERS DISCUSS G. O. P. AFFILIATION

NEW YORK, May 11.—The next move is up to the republicans in the political game. It may result in reaffiliation of the G. O. P. with the bull moose.

Members of the progressive national executive committee so indicated today following yesterday's conference, which declared for political peace but not peace at any price.

Convention arrangements were discussed at the conference.

The selection of a man to deliver the keynote speech was also talked over. Announcement of the result was withheld.

It was indicated that if the republicans concede enough progressive principles, the bull moose convention will simmer down to considering the proper method of entry into the republican fold.

Progressives regard their candidate as a consideration of the first importance.

They will "follow only a leader who stands for our principles and is able to put them thru."

Roosevelt will fit nicely. It was admitted that Hughes might fit, but there was not a chance for Elihu Root.

It is expected Roosevelt will deliver a "keynote" progressive speech at Kansas City on Decoration Day.

Roosevelt has practically abandoned the idea of delivering further speeches west of there.

It is understood he is considering staying away from the Chicago convention.

## Letters To Cynthia Grey

Q.—Last year Hon. Chas. Marsh Thomson of Chicago, Ill., was a member of congress (house of rep.) Is he still a member of the house this year?

A.—Chill the plants thoroly by letting them lie on the ice in a paper bag for several hours before serving. Wash them well. When they are ready for the salad course, arrange the leaves on individual salad plates, like you do with lettuce. Pour over them a dressing of hard-boiled eggs, put thru the ricer and garnish with slices of crisp bacon. A dressing may be added, made of the clarified vinegar fat, two tablespoonsful of onion, salt and cayenne to taste. This, of course, must be quite hot. French dressing may be substituted in warm weather.

Q.—I know of a nest containing a number of pheasant eggs which appear to have been abandoned. Would it be against the law to put those eggs under a hen and hatch them? Please answer in your next issue. I was clearing land and ran across them. A SUBSCRIBER.
