PIERSON INNOCENT, COURT SAYS

LUNDIN BLOCKS COMMISSIONERS

Prosecutor Lundin killed Monday a \$20,000 gift road contract that County Commissioner Krist Knudsen had intended to bestow upon the Cascade Construction Co., of Seattle.

Knudsen proposed to hand the contract over to the company without going to the trouble of asking for bids to learn if any other concern would do the job cheaper. The contract called for 5,100 feet of paving to extend a road the company is already building between Bothell and Hollywood. Knudsen pleased to call his intended gift "incidental expense."

Commissioner M. J. Carrigan nulled the contract as Knudsen was slipping it thru to a vote of the commissioners last Monday. He demanded an opinion from the prosecutor.

Lundin held that so large an item could not be called "incidental expense."

"All road construction of an estimated cost of \$2,500 or more," he states in his opinion, "must be let by contract to the lowest and best bidder."

"If this sort of thing were allowed," said Carrigan, "we could let an original contract for \$1 worth of brick and vote the contractor \$100,000 for 'incidental expenses' of laying the road."

ARREST 13 AS NIGHT RIDERS

TACOMA, May 22.—Warrants have been issued for four Pacific county men, in addition to the nine already taken into custody, for alleged connection with the famous "night rider" case.

They are Joe Axford, E. E. Burke, W. E. Burke and Virgil Dolan.

They are reported to have left the district.

The nine ranchers already under arrest are Homer F. Blaine, Trenton W. Tisdwell, John N. Howard, Ralph N. Howard, Claude Vanderpool, Mike Hanrahan, Enoch S. Dillard, James C. Simmons, deputy sheriff of Pacific county, and Earl Timmons.

All 13 men had previously been cleared in Pacific county of "night riding" charges brought by Mrs. Margaret Ross.

They are now charged, on federal grand jury indictments, with interfering with settlers on federal lands.

The affair practically reached the feud stage nearly a year ago.

Mrs. Ross and her two sons had settled on what they believed to be an abandoned claim.

There was an attempt to elect them and neighborhood quarrels ensued, until one dark night a mob of horsemen appeared at the Ross cabin and forcibly carried them away.

During this wild ride thru the forest, Mrs. Ross alleged she was roughly handled and sustained injuries.

The Ross boys returned to the section, and many fights followed, which ended with the two being sent to jail.

Frank Olsson, Jr., accused of falsifying the accounts of Wm. H. Pierson & Co., manufacturer's agents, in which he was a partner with his father-in-law, W. H. Pierson, was declared innocent of the crime charged and dismissed Monday by Judge Gilliam.

In doing so, he ruled that a check stub which Olsson was accused of falsifying could not be called a "record of account."

Olsson was said to have written a check for \$15 on August 17, charging it to "W. H. P."

The check was indorsed and cashed, it is said, by Olsson, and Pierson declares he got no money.

The corresponding entry in the journal is said to have been for \$10.

Pierson had reported to the prosecuting attorney that irregularities in the company's books amounted to about \$11,000.
