Whether a man's home and his club are his castles to the extent that he may fill them with contraband booze without fear of the law, is a question that will be decided at Olympia Wednesday by the supreme court judges sitting en banc. Prosecutor Lundin left Tuesday to appear before the court with arguments in support of the state's contention that W. E. Boeing, millionaire lumberman, and John C. Eden, prominent member of the Rainier club, violated the "dry" law. They will also be represented by counsel who will argue that Boeing's constitutional rights were infringed when sheriff Hodge raided his magnificent residence at the Highlands last winter and found several thousand dollars' worth of wines and other choice liquors, and that the same condition exists in Eden's case. Eden's lockers at the club revealed large quantities of booze. Both were found to have violated the law in superior court here, and both appealed to the supreme bench.

### ESTABROOK QUILTS

CHICAGO, May 23.—Henry Estabrook, New York lawyer and prominent candidate for the presidency in the Minnesota and Nebraska primaries, today closed his campaign headquarters at the Congress without explanation. Secretary Reynolds of the republicans received word today of seven more contests in the Alabama delegation, making a total of 54. Chairman Hillier has not yet arrived. He is expected tomorrow.

### WANTED TO BE SURE

LOS ANGELES, May 23.—The aged caretaker of the Forest Lawn cemetery at sunrise today entered the marble tomb of the late Wm. G. Kipp, capitalist, who recently killed himself, to view the remains of Kipp and make certain he is not alive.

Every day at sunrise, for two months, Kipp's remains will be viewed. This was his last request. He feared he might be buried alive.

### EATS PASTE; MAY DIE

LOS ANGELES, May 23.—Near death for the second time within six months as a result of eating paste, Margaret Carson, 2, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Carson, was taken to the receiving hospital today. Little hope is held out for her recovery.

### MOTHER CONVICTED

PORTLAND, May 23.—After 20 minutes' deliberation, a jury here convicted Mrs. Will Hodge for contributing to the delinquency of her 16-year-old daughter, Frances. Mrs. Hodge, the indictment alleged, had permitted Frances to frequent public dances and all-night restaurants and to associate with men of doubtful character.

### CITY TO BUILD R. R.

ROSEBURG, Ore., May 23.—A municipally built railroad from Roseburg into the timber belt of the Cascades, was believed assured today as the result of the adoption of an amendment to the city charter yesterday. The amendment was adopted in a special election by a vote of 547 to 94.
