EMPTY CRADLES WORRY ENGLAND

Father Vaughn, in Remarkable Lecture, Shows English Women Their Duty

MOTHERS ARE NEEDED

FROM NOTES TAKEN BY MARY BOYLE O'REILLY
Rev. Bernard Vaughn is best known in the United States through his famous sermons on "The Sin of Society." Father Vaughn has lectured in this country and Canada, and in many cities in Asia and Europe. His fame as a worker among the London poor has been doubled since the war began by his efforts in behalf of Belgian refugees.—EDITOR.

BY FATHER VAUGHN
LONDON, May 22.—The cry, "Back to the land" is not so important as "Back to the home."

The cradles of England are empty. We are a nation traveling to the cemetery. Never was the marriage rate so high; never the birth rate so low, and that at a time when the cry is to replace the men we are losing.

When I was a lad the birth rate in England was 37 to 40 per thousand. Today it has fallen to 19. It takes days to make a shell, weeks to forge a gun, months to build a ship. But a man is not a man for 20 years.

The waste of men is the longest loss of war. It is a waste beyond computation because it stretches far into the future, in which, under happier conditions, these men, dead in our country, would have been the fathers of children we need.

No sane man facing these facts can doubt that our whole national future is in jeopardy. Bluejackets, men in khaki, splendid air men, are risking their lives to save our honor from disgrace, our country from invasion, ourselves from vassalage and serfdom. And we?

I see everywhere on the streets of our mammoth metropolises bejeweled ladies in the daintiest of footwear—which you can see as far as ever it reaches, and the most perfect hats. And, if you look a little longer you will see that a costly pet dog is cuddled somewhere, a plaything that could easily be replaced by two men in khaki as far as money goes. Is this right, or fair, in the women of wartime England?

It is not men, munitions or money we want most now. It is the mother we need today, and shall need more and more. We want war wives, truly, but war wives proud to meet God's will to become mothers.

SHERIFF LETS A PRISONER GO

Refuses to Hold Fugitive Wanted on Charge of Missing Drill

STRINGER IS ANGERED

Strictly speaking, Deputy Sheriff John Stringer, candidate for sheriff, is in contempt of the state military court.

Stringer defied the court Tuesday by refusing to throw William F. Weeden, a young man employed by the Lily Seed Co., into jail. "Arrest and hold W. F. Weeden, 1707 W. Spokane st.," reads a warrant Stringer received by wire from Sheriff Lee Barnes of Walla Walla county Monday. "We have warrant."

Stringer sent Deputy Scott Malone after the fugitive. "What do they want you for?" asked Stringer when the prisoner arrived in custody at the sheriff's office.

"It must be for failing to attend National Guard drill," said Weeden. Stringer was hot. It costs \$120 to transport a prisoner from Seattle to Walla Walla. He wired Sheriff Barnes, demanding an explanation of the charge against Weeden.

"Wanted to serve out a fine of \$8.17 and costs for not attending drill," the reply said. Stringer promptly released Weeden, who went back to work. "I am for preparedness," said Stringer, "but I don't stand for a policy of this kind."

HEAVENS! HOW NICE EVERYTHING'S GOING
world, President Wilson, with marvelous skill, sagacity and firmness, has kept the country out of war and yet has upheld every American right, protected every American citizen, and vindicated American honor.

By his wise, courageous and enlightened course he has compelled the warring nations to recognize the rights of humanity and the principles of international law. (This may seem tough on German voters, but it will have good results.) The nation has been brought to the highest pinnacle of greatness and influence before the world, and all is due to a democratic president.

TARIFF: At home the party's wise administration has brought upon the country unprecedented prosperity. Under the stimulating effects of a democratic tariff, business has revived, industry has flourished as never before, wages have increased, and peace and plenty have descended upon all.

EFFICIENCY: But the blessings of neutrality and the new tariff are by no means all that democratic wisdom has conferred upon our nation. It has conducted national affairs with prudence, wisdom and economy. Look at the superfluous clerks it has fired from the pension bureau and elsewhere.

ACHIEVEMENTS: It has passed more progressive and remedial legislation than any other administration. It holds the benevolent record of the federal reserve act, and that which will be eloquently eulogized, but is, after all, only a starter. We call attention to the new anti-trust law, which has abolished monopolies in our fair land; to the law establishing the federal trade commission, which has kept down the price of gasoline; to the rural credit law, which will bring joy to every farmer; to the good roads bill, neatly distributing the pork; to the child labor bill (if it gets thru alive); to the Shields water power bill, which develops our water powers, and the others that show how perfectly we are fitted to run things.

LABOR: The democratic party, ever true to the interests of the workingman, passed laws that abolish the prosecution of labor unions in cases where they are interested. It has also passed the seaman's act, which for the first time emancipates the sailor and raises him to his true place of dignity and opulence.

PREPAREDNESS: Wholly devoted to the country's welfare, the democratic party has effected an adequate national defense. It has wisely and moderately increased the army (perhaps) and has adopted a naval program that in eight years will give us the second navy in the world. At the same time, it is utterly and unwaveringly opposed to militarism and in favor of peace.

Other plans will deal with the regulation of corporations, conservation (delicately handled) and other matters, but it is the foregoing, I am told, that will be relied upon to catch them coming and going.
