ROOSEVELT BOOM IS OFFICIALLY ON

NEW YORK, May 23.—Regular republicans today opened headquarters for a Roosevelt boom.

The Rooseveltians are all former Taft men. There are no progressives among them.

They plan to move to Chicago shortly.

Yesterday afternoon a delegation of 25, headed by Meyer, visited the colonel at Oyster Bay and notified him that the Roosevelt republican committee, with membership in 30 states, had been organized to work for his nomination.

Roosevelt briefly outlined the principles of Americanism upon which he stands, and added: "They are the principles you are organizing to support, and with all my heart I welcome such support, accepting it as given, primarily to the principles, and only secondarily for myself."

Politicians today regarded Col. Theodore Roosevelt's speech to the delegates as an open bid for the G. O. P. nomination.

They saw an attempt to smoke out Justice Hughes in the colonel's declaration that no man would be named by the convention unless he flatly announced his position on Americanism and preparedness.

Roosevelt's speech was carefully prepared and his attitude apparently deliberately assumed. With regard to Americanism and prepared-

ness, he said: "Any man at this time of crisis who is not aggressively, openly and specifically for these principles is against them, and every patriotic man should treat our public servants on this basis."

It is believed Roosevelt will be persuaded to make a brief whirlwind campaign thru the Middle West, following his speech at Kansas City on Memorial day.

T. R. HAS GOOD TIME
WASHINGTON, May 23.—Col. Theodore Roosevelt enjoyed himself to the full today when he testified in Justice Giddons' court as a character witness for Charles C. Glover, president of the Riggs National bank who is accused by the government of perjury in connection with an affidavit made by his bank.

The colonel was in court before either judge or jury arrived.

Mrs. Alice Longworth, his daughter, accompanied him. The courtroom was packed.

Cheers greeted Roosevelt as he walked inside the rail and greeted Glover.

The applause continued until Justice Giddons entered, with the colonel apparently appreciating it.

Attorney Stanchfield put the former president on the stand immediately.

He gave his occupation as a writer and said that in the campaign of 1912 Glover was against him, favoring either Wilson or Taft.

"Glover is absolutely the highest man in Washington from a standpoint of integrity and general knowledge," he asserted.

Roosevelt said that he and his children used the Riggs bank.

When lawyers for the opposition interposed objections to certain questions, the colonel glared at them.

He also glared at the judge when the objections were sustained.

LONGSHOREMEN DEMAND RAISE

Union longshoremen served notice on employers Monday that every member of their organization from Alaska to San Diego would strike June 1, unless a new schedule of wages is paid.

The demands include a raise of from 50 cents to 60 cents an hour for lumber handling, and a raise from 75 cents to \$1 an hour for overtime.

A 10-cent hourly increase in demanded for handling creosoted lumber.

It was decided to ask for increases in wages at the Pacific Coast division convention of the International Longshoremen's association, held here two weeks ago.

FITZGERALD BLOCKS CITY INDORSEMENT OF GILL BOOZE FIGHT

Fur is scheduled to fly at the city hall some time Tuesday when Mayor Gill meets Councilman Fitzgerald.

Mayor Gill declares Fitzgerald blocked passage of Councilman Moore's resolution indorsing his campaign against illicit liquor sales at Monday's council meeting.

Fitzgerald himself introduced a resolution, which was defeated, after the Moore measure had been stopped by a 4-to-4 vote.

Fitzgerald's resolution tendered support and assistance of the council "in so far as it may be within the province and power of the council to render assistance."

Moore's resolution pledged assistance "as the mayor from time to time may determine and request."

The situation now is that the council has failed to pass the indorsement resolution promised more than a week ago, because its members can't agree on the wording.

"It looks to me like Fitzgerald is trying to make trouble between me and my bond holders," said the mayor, after the meeting. "I'm certainly going to try to find out who he is working for in this deal."

Fitzgerald told the councilmen his resolution was merely, in his opinion, a safer measure.

Councilman Haas, Dale, Moore and Bolton voted for the Moore resolution.

Fitzgerald, Hanna, Erickson and Hesketh voted against it. Thomson was not present.

Only Fitzgerald, Hanna and Hesketh voted for Fitzgerald's resolution.

The council passed Bolton's resolution calling for a conference between the county commissioners and a city committee to determine some remedy for the poor ventilation, and annoying acoustics in the new quarters of the councilmen and their clerks in the county-city building.

CAPLAN DENIES MESERVE TALE

LOS ANGELES, May 23.—David Caplan, in his cell in the county prison here today, completely denied all charges in a statement given to a Seattle paper by Donald Vose Meserve, a Burns detective, at Seattle, that he was implicated in the assassination of President McKinley and numerous bomb outrages.

"I never heard of anything so outrageously absurd in my life," said Caplan, who is waiting his second trial for complicity in the Times explosion here Oct. 1, 1910.

The prisoner appeared very much astonished when informed in detail of Meserve's charges.

"It's absolutely false and shows the extent to which Meserve has gone thru his enmity for me," Caplan said.

"At the time President McKinley was assassinated I was in New York city, working for the Metropolitan Railroad company. I was on my ranch with my family at Rolling Bay, Washington, at the time of the St. Patrick's cathedral bomb episode in New York.

"The stories about the bomb in Tombs prison, and the aeroplane bomb idea for the Rockefeller place at Tarrytown, are pure inventions as far as I know."
