### LOOKS BAD NOW FOR BRANDEIS

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Senate Lineup on Rublee Case Shocks Boston Man's Friends

### HOW IT WAS WORKED

BY GILSON GARDNER WASHINGTON, May 26.—That the senate is likely to refuse to confirm Louis D. Brandeis, the president's appointee for the U. S. supreme court, is the inference drawn by politicians at the capitol from the senate vote rejecting the confirmation of George Rublee for the federal trade commission.

candidate is a republican or democrat, but whether he is a "kept" man or the people's man.

Senator Poindexter is in a position to know a great deal about what is going on. He says the water power grabbers are fighting every inch of ground.

He says monopolization of the nation's water power means control, not only of the people's luxuries and conveniences, but control of their food, their heat, their power, their light, and, without exaggeration, almost their very life itself.

The senator declares that he will continue to vote against any measure to barter away forever to private parties this control over the necessities of life.

In the Shields bill, which has passed the senate, Senator Poindexter says the federal government serves no right of control over power rights in navigable streams except in certain cases and to a very moderate extent.

This is the testimony of all who are on the side of the people in the struggle, and it can only be by the action of the house or the veto of the president that the power brigadiers will be prevented from carrying the measure thru.

The cry of the power barons is that more liberal legislation is needed to secure "development."

The triplets came into the world as a result of a Caesarean operation; the only infants so born within this section's medical annals.

"Herman, Ernest, who was named for his father, is the image of him," she declares. Joseph Frances, who was named for the hospital, has the more expressive face. Charles Alphonso, named after the two doctors, has a meditative countenance.

Only one baby was expected. Nurses insisted on donating a fund to buy clothing for the extra two.

Brandeis is next in line for the senate special privilege quillotine.

Since the Rublee vote, the friends of Brandeis feel less confident.

The same influences which opposed Rublee oppose Brandeis, and the reasons for the opposition are fundamentally the same.

Rublee and Brandeis were for a considerable time associated in their public service labors.

Rublee helped Brandeis draw the bill which became the federal trade commission law.

Both were attorneys on the public side in the Ballinger investigation.

As an acting member—pending confirmation—of the federal trade commission, Rublee has tried to carry out the original purpose of the law, which was to curb the brutalities of the competitive system and make trade freer for the weaker man.

Unfortunately, a majority of the federal trade commissioners are entirely out of sympathy with the purposes of this act.

Commissioner Hurley and Commissioner Davies are more interested in using the commission to secure in the United States the German cartel plan for co-operation among manufacturers seeking foreign markets than they are in protecting the consumer from impositions like the Standard Oil company price of gasoline.

The commission, under Hurley's direction, has devoted most of its time to this subject, and to trying to find a way in which the lumber business could add to its profits without entailing the penalties of the Sherman anti-trust law.

In these activities of the commission, Rublee has been a minority.

"Senatorial courtesy" was nominally the ground for opposing Rublee. Gallinger announced that the appointment was "personally objectionable" to him.

Rublee comes from Gallinger's state and has been a political opponent of Gallinger.

A recent development of the theory of senatorial courtesy leaves it to any senator to veto an executive appointment, whether of a local or national character, by saying it is personally objectionable.

Other senators, seeing an opportunity to increase their power by the exercise of a similar veto over somebody in their state, fall into line and support the senatorial courtesy theory.

This enables all the vicious influences in the senate to co-operate to block all good appointments.

Republicans who were willing to disregard party lines to line up against Special Privilege, were Clapp, Minn.; Kenyon, Iowa; LaFollette, Wis.; Norris, Neb. and Poindexter, Wash.
