## United Press Military Expert Analyzes Battle of Skagerak

NEW YORK, June 5.—The result of the Skagerak naval battle will add new prestige to the growing record of Germany's young navy.  
It will have a stimulating moral effect upon the Germans and must depress the British navy because of the large disparity in losses.  
But the major purpose of the opposing navies in the present war is to keep trade routes open for friendly merchantmen and to close them to enemy merchantmen.  
The success of the German fleet in the Skagerak will not open German ports to the trade of the world.  
Not a pound of meat nor a barrel of flour will enter Germany because of the battle, and for this reason the military effect of the clash cannot possess major importance.  
Present information suggests that the British cruiser squadron was led into a German trap. Unless the battle was an accidental meeting of the opposing forces, which is not probable, it seems likely that a new policy of observation close to German waters was being put into operation by the British admiralty.

## SEATTLE CHINESE ENTER A FLOAT IN SATURDAY PARADE

Chinese advocates of national defense will take part in Seattle's preparedness parade, Saturday.  
I. Y. Mark, representing the Chinese Nationalist league, went to preparedness headquarters Monday morning and asked for a float reservation.  
"We want to show Seattle that China has at last realized the need of preparedness," he said.  
Word was sent from Port Orchard that a delegation of 90 would be in Seattle early Saturday morning, ready for the parade.  
The mayor there has proclaimed the day a holiday.  
Seventeen hundred marchers were added to the list Tuesday, when the Knights of Columbus reported that they would unite delegations from Everett, Bremerton, Tacoma and Seattle into one great regiment.  
Other recruits were from the Mill and Mine Supply Co., Uhl Bros., Shogerman & Sons, Crane Co. and the Royal Neighbors.  
Negotiations have been completed with the railroads, so they will offer fare and a third rate from all Northwest cities to Seattle.  
Lister in Reviewing Stand  
Details of the parade are being worked out at headquarters Tuesday.  
Gov. Lister, Mayor Gill and senior army and navy officers stationed near Seattle will be in the reviewing stand.  
The women's divisions will lead the parade. They will be followed by veterans' organizations, patriotic societies, city, county, state and federal employes, fraternal orders, civic and political societies, professional men, mercantile societies, manufacturers, transportation men, military organizations, and, finally, the automobiles.  
Students to March  
High school students are being organized, with separate units from each school. They will assemble at First and Vine st., at 2:30 p. m. Saturday.  
A big delegation of marchers from Port Townsend will take part in the Seattle demonstration.  
Joshua Green, of the Puget Sound Navigation Co., will carry them to Seattle free of charge.  
Many of the big downtown stores will close for the parade, to permit their employees to march.

CONVENTION CHEERING  
CHICAGO, June 6.—The republican convention of 1880 was the first in which a woman spectator was "used" to force a demonstration by brandishing a flag and shouting a candidate's name. The same ruse has been used in practically every convention of both parties, since.  
History records that the 1880 republican convention cheered Blaine's name 35 minutes and Grant's 30 minutes. This was the first "long distance" cheering record.  
Demonstrations in conventions since that time have frequently continued for 45 and 50 minutes, and indeed, in 1908 at the democratic convention, Bryan's adherents cheered and applauded the Nebraska for nearly an hour and a half.

## PORT EXPLAINS STRIKE STAND

Accepts Demands of Longshoremen as Matter of Public Policy  
CHARGE IS REFUTED

The port commission has decided to recognize the demands of the union longshoremen, "rather than play the game of the railroads and private dock owners who are responsible for the tie-up," according to its members, Tuesday.  
The commission Monday voted to send Robert Bridges, its president, to San Francisco, to confer with the union longshoremen officials and shipowners over the strike situation.  
Left Tuesday morning, "The commission has nothing to do with the actual loading and unloading of ships," explained Traffic Manager Hiday, of the port commission, Tuesday. "The shipowners attend to that."  
"The port commission has merely expressed willingness to agree with the longshoremen to recognize their demands for the right to truck freight to and from vessels loading and discharging."  
Hiday explained that if private dock owners in Seattle refuse to grant the union demands, and at the same time San Francisco granted them, Seattle would be passed up by many shippers.  
"The port commissioners want the public terminals open for business, no matter what game the private dock men play," he said.  
The port is willing to pay the longshoremen for the trucking according to their new scale, to keep Seattle open for commerce.  
The private dock men have charged the port commission granted the union demands in order to get business at the expense of private cargo-handling concerns.  
U. S. Immigration Commissioner Henry M. White, who has represented the federal department of labor during the negotiations for a settlement of the strike, left Tuesday for San Francisco, to attend the union conference Wednesday.  
Ten special policemen were assigned to duty on the water front Tuesday, at the request of the shipping companies.

## SEATTLE MOOSE HAVE A PEEVE ON

Don't Like Way Old Guard Delegates Sniff at Col. Roosevelt's Chances  
LINE UP WITH JOHNSON

CHICAGO, June 6.—An effort will be made at a caucus to be held at 6 o'clock tonight to have the Washington republican delegation vote as a unit.  
Thus far the delegation is split chiefly between Hughes and Root.  
A secret caucus was held at the Sherman hotel this morning, and the delegates expressed their individual preference. One man was for Cummins. The rest were for Hughes and Root.  
The feeling prevailed, however, that Hughes was out of it, and the Washingtonians are not disposed favorably toward Roosevelt.  
One of the Hughes men wanted to wear a Hughes badge, but was persuaded not to do so until the question of unit rule was decided.  
A scouting committee was appointed at the noon meeting today, consisting of Chairman Lund and Delegates Taylor, Bowles, Sloan and Polson. Bowles and Sloan are avowedly against Roosevelt.  
There is also an anxious feeling among the delegates because alternates have been permitted so far to attend the secret caucuses. Evidently the chief anxiety is caused by the presence of Councilman Hesketh, the only progressive in the aggregation. A rule may be adopted tonight to shut alternates out.  
The progressives of Washington responded heartily to Gov. Johnson's call for a caucus this afternoon of all progressives. Most of the Washingtonians are with the Johnson group to nominate Roosevelt at once, as opposed to Perkins' plan of watchfully waiting.  
Real fireworks are expected at the caucus and also at the meeting tonight of national committee-men jointly with state chairman.  
There is a strong disposition to fight instead of temporizing. Progressives are getting madder every minute as old guardsmen keep up their boasts that Roosevelt is out of question.  
The key to the situation seems to be largely up to Penrose. This was stated today by William Barnes of New York to Col. Martin Mulhall of Seattle.  
Barnes, the ostensibly for Root, is ready to swing to Hughes. He said the Penrose attitude is disquieting. Should Penrose decide for Roosevelt, the colonel may be nominated. If Penrose should swing to Roosevelt, there seems to be no chance for him.  
Congressman Dill of Spokane is looking upon the situation with a broad smile spread over his face.  
"Roosevelt will not be nominated by republicans," he predicted.  
"The progressives will have their own ticket, and Wilson will be elected."

## BILLINGSLEY IS FREE ONCE MORE

After Logan Billingsley, proprietor of the Day and Night Express, 1525 Third, had been bound over to the federal grand jury as an alleged violator of the antinarcotic drug act, chemical analysis of the "drugs" taken from him at the time of his arrest, recently, and which were found to be morphine and cocaine, proved the stuff Tuesday to be a mixture of powdered moth balls and quinine.  
District Attorney Clay Allen admitted there had been a "frameup" of some kind.  
He believed, he said, that it might have been a ruse attempted by Billingsley to prevent his being taken back to Oklahoma as a fugitive from justice.  
At the time of his arrest an Oklahoma sheriff was en route here to take Billingsley back.  
The man is here yet and will probably return with the prisoner shortly, or as soon as the federal charge is dismissed.  
Had the discovery not been made that the "drugs" taken from Billingsley were not "dope" at all, at this time, the Oklahoma sheriff would probably have left the city soon empty-handed and the federal charge would have fallen flat.  
Deputy Sheriffs Madden and Campbell, who arrested Billingsley, say they are nonplussed, as is County Jailor Halley, who received the two bottles taken from the prisoner.  
"They were labeled morphine and cocaine," said Halley, "and the seals were apparently unbroken. I turned them over to the federal authorities."  
The case is similar to a number of others, in which Johnny Clancy was the alleged offender.  
Bottled evidence, supposed to have been liquor, turned out to be harmless and non-alcoholic on several occasions.  
Prosecutor Lundin at the time declared the contents of the bottles was switched, and laid the blame on the sheriff's office.  
Attorney George Vanderveer represents Billingsley, as he did Clancy during the latter's trials.

## Mountain in Canada Named After Martyr

OTTAWA, June 6.—Canada has officially decided to honor the martyr, Edith Cavell, whom the Germans executed in Belgium as a British spy, by putting her name on one of the most rugged and picturesque of the Western range peaks.

## SEATTLE WOMAN WORKING FOR T. R.

CHICAGO, June 6.—One of the most belligerently pro-Roosevelt persons in Chicago is Mrs. C. H. Wharton of Seattle.  
Mrs. Wharton has stumped the Northwest for Roosevelt more than once, and she organized Roosevelt clubs among the women of scores of Northwestern towns.  
She has a petition, signed by 3,000 of those women, which she will have presented to the republican convention, asking that the G. O. P. name him for its presidential candidate.  
ST. LOUIS, June 6.—J. Bruce Kremer of Montana has resigned as secretary of the democratic national committee, for business reasons. No successor has been named.

## 'JIM' HILL'S SON, WHO RULES 'EMPIRE' NOW, ARTIST AND DREAMER

Louis Warren Hill today may well be called the prince regent of the empire of the Northwest.  
For the railroad crown of the great territory which his dead father, the famous "J. J." opened up, has been handed down to his son, Louis.  
When J. J. Hill died Louis was president of the Great Northern and chairman of the board of directors of the Northwestern Trust company, his father's two most valuable properties.  
He has been called the most unusual railroad president in America.  
If fate had not given him a railroad-building father, Louis Hill would probably have been an artist. His pictures have been praised by some of the best critics in America.  
Yet upon analysis there seems to be nothing very strange in the fact that "Jim" Hill's son should possess enough imagination to paint good pictures.  
It was imagination that enabled his father, back in the early fifties, to foresee the tremendous development that came to the Northwest.  
It was imagination that spurred him on in the enormous projects for which he became known around the world.  
It is imagination that has made Louis Hill one of the best publicity getters that any railroad ever had.  
His father opened up the Northwest, but the son "put it on the map" by making its opportunities known through the newspapers and magazines of the world.  
Besides painting Hill plays the violin, runs his own auto, studies native Indian dialects and is the best after-dinner speaker in Minnesota.  
Of all his many hobbies his most ambitious is the development of a tract of 800,000 acres in central Oregon which he owns with other capitalists.
