

OLD GUARD USES NICE SOFT WORDS

Spreads Tempting Viands Before Progressives at Chicago

TRY TO WIN 'EM BACK

CHICAGO, June 6.—Talk of the probable nominee today through the hotel lobbies today, but it is not engrossing much of the time of the conference in the inner circle.

Here all thought and effort is bent on salving over old scars, spreading tempting viands before returning prodigals, and to whittling down to a minimum that faction of the progressive party which it is recognized can never be coaxed back into the fold.

The lowest point to which this non-conformist force can be reduced, and hence the smaller the inroads into the normal republican majority attributable to internal dissension, the greater will be the latitude left to the party leaders in the selection of a candidate.

The organization is out to exterminate soreheadedness and to heal every possible laceration of political feelings resulting from 1912.

This determination explains Senator Smoot's insistence upon full publicity for all contests before the national committee.

He protested against referring these contests to subcommittees and against action which, while regular, might give even the smallest excuse for the charge that the committee was not playing fair.

It explains the superabundance of judicial temperament exercised by the committee in deciding contests so as to cause the least possible friction.

The "campaign of attrition" being directed against progressives through soft words and actions, further explains the day by day popularity of the favorite sons, each of whom is in turn being pushed forward for a day of popularity and public inspection, and incidentally to see if any one of them starts to be reflected even more emphatically in the unheard-of liberality of action accorded by the suggestion that the resolutions committee hear arguments for platform planks in open session—an invitation for any person to come up and speak his mind on any subject.

It will be urged along tomorrow, when the convention opens, by a calmly deliberative process of procedure.

None of the old republican leaders think all of the progressives can be brought back into the fold, but they figure on coaxing back enough to prevent Wilson being elected by a minority vote.

Tomorrow Chicago expects to see the biggest convention crowds in history.

Every hotel in the city is crowded to its fullest capacity and temporary sleeping quarters are being eagerly reserved.

HUGHES MAKES A RADICAL MOOSE DECIDE ON PLAN

Speaks Patriotic Words to Young Women Graduates

DAUGHTER IS PRESENT

WASHINGTON, June 6.—Justice Charles E. Hughes today made his first public address since the opening of the pre-convention campaign.

He told young women graduates of the National Cathedral school, of whom his daughter was one, that the flag meant "America first, an undivided allegiance and a nation united and equal to its tasks."

He presented an American flag to the honor graduates.

"This flag means more than association and reward," said the justice. "It is the symbol of our national unity, our national endeavor, our national aspirations."

"It tells you of the struggle for independence; of the Union preserved; of liberty and union, one and inseparable; of the sacrifices of brave men and women to whom the ideals and honor of this nation have been dearer than life."

"It means America first; it means an undivided allegiance."

"It means America united, strong and efficient, equal to her tasks; it means that you cannot be saved by the valor and devotion of your ancestors; that to each generation comes its patriotic duty, and that upon your willingness to sacrifice and endure, as those before you have sacrificed and endured, rests the national hope."

ANALYZES SPEECH OF JUSTICE HUGHES

United Press Staff Correspondent CHICAGO, June 6.—The Hughes graduating day speech at Washington was adjudged by his own volunteer workers here as the nearest to a clear-cut definition of where the former stands as it was possible for a justice of the supreme court to make.

It was held by the progressives to be entirely too impalpable of application to present issues to give a satisfactory line on the justice's views.

The favorite sons viewed the speech as merely a patriotic talk, which very properly ought not to be construed as a creed of faith.

Coincident with the reading of Hughes' veil of silence came a plan today by the old guard for a public and formal scraping of the steamroller.

The organization wants to emphasize its argument since the first delegates arrived—that the convention is to be free and untrammelled in all its actions.

The organization is sure of its control. It has the votes to put over any candidate it chooses. The most radical progressive scarcely disputed this today.

WANT VON TIRPITZ AT HEAD OF NAVY

LONDON, June 6.—Dispatches from The Hague to London say that, since the Skagerak sea fight, there has been a growing demand for the restoration of Admiral Von Tirpitz as head of the German sea forces.

The dispatches say the German conservative and national liberal parties are making a concerted move in this direction, not being satisfied with the result of the sea fight.

HEADED BY MURDOCK

Call Mass Meeting to Force Nomination of T. R. Friday

United Press Staff Correspondent CHICAGO, June 6.—Determined on a program of Roosevelt or nothing, radical bull moose today jumped square into the limelight with a challenge to conservative progressives to do their worst.

Delegates from 18 Southern and Western states headed the movement, and were believed to have aligned with them Victor Murdock chairman of the progressive national committee; Wm. Allen White, Kansas bull moose chieftain, and Raymond Robins, who will be temporary chairman of the progressives.

They have determined on this program:

Nominate Roosevelt Friday, the third day of the convention.

Run a third party if the republicans refuse to accept the colonel.

When word of the conference of the 18 state delegations reached Murdock today, the Kansas declared:

"We will nominate the colonel. You can quote me to that effect."

Call Him Pussycooter

Members of this radical clan today characterized the first public utterance of Justice Hughes, made late yesterday in Washington, as a "typical pussycooter speech."

"They realized a bid for progressive support for Hughes would be made on the basis of the American issue in Hughes' address."

They held, however, that this speech was so full of generalities as to be meaningless.

"Hughes has not made a single plain statement of his platform," the radicals declared.

Various caucuses today expected to sharpen the alignment of radicals and conservatives.

WOMAN WILL KEEP DELEGATES IN ORDER

CHICAGO, June 6.—The first woman sergeant-at-arms ever appointed for a political convention is Mrs. Sarah E. Lyons of Minneapolis, who arrived here today, all ready to quell any disturbances that may arise among the 33 women delegates to the progressive convales.

"But I would rather handle the women than the men," she said. "Women are a whole lot more lovable in a meeting than are the men. They are more logical and systematic, and easier to control. I don't anticipate any trouble at all, but I'll handle it if it arises."
