Willie Ritchie, former king of the lightweights, and Ralph Gruman, who was going to the top of the lightweight heap at about 60 per cent before he met Gilbert Gallant in Salt Lake, will furnish the main event of an all-star card this evening in the Rose City.

Both of the men are now welterweights. Both are about as clever as any topnotcher in the country and both will be out to win.
Portland betting accords Ritchie the best of the going, at odds of 5 to 4.
RITCHIE IS FAVORED TO WIN BOUT
In our opinion Ritchie knows too much for the clever youngster. In fact, Ritchie has everything in his favor. He will weigh several pounds more than Gruman, has had the most experience, and has had a fight since Gruman last fought. This is Gruman's first appearance since Gallant broke his jaw in Salt Lake and forced him to quit.

Mick King, Australian middleweight, is on his way to the United States. Mick is the boxer from whom Les Darcy won the middleweight title of the Antipodes. There was nothing sensational in the bout, although I had proved to the promoter that I was a good light weight, with a good punch and in good condition. That made 12 rounds in one day, with a rest in between that taxed the vitality more than a 20-round bout.
The promoter lived up to his agreement and I was matched with Lee Crooks, who the Eddie Shannon of San Francisco, could only get two draws with and some say he should have had the decision in one of the bouts.
We were to box in the same club next Thursday, giving me four days to get my judge of distance, which was very bad, due to my five months of retired life.
The next day, as I was going down bed at 9 o'clock and arising at 6, the day being spent in training, with a great deal of walking. On the night of the bout, I met two more Seattle friends, Earl Darlington and Bill Beaulier. I was introduced to Charles Chaplin, Fred Flaback, Charlie Murray, Harry Gibbons, Al McCoy, Patsy Valse and again to Mr. Henderson.
The five prelims went very fast and soon Lee Crooks and I crawled thru the ropes.
"The next bout and main event of the evening will be Lee Crooks of Los Angeles vs. Eddie Brewster, of St. Paul, at 133 lbs."

Since then he has won every race he has entered, and is improving rapidly. He prefers to enter contests anonymously, until he has reached the goal of perfection he has set out to attain.
