BILLINGSLEY IS NOW IN CANADA

Druggist Slips Across Line; Leaves Oklahoma Sheriff Holding Bag
BONDSMEN ALL CLEAR

Logan Billingsley, well-known druggist, and Sheriff M. C. Binion, of Oklahoma City, who has been waiting here a week to take the former back as a fugitive from justice, have left the city Wednesday.
They did not go together. Billingsley settled up his legal matters and other affairs late Monday and left for the Dominion of Canada.
Sheriff Binion remained in the city until Tuesday afternoon, when he departed on the 4:30 train, homeward bound.
The druggist, who is wanted in Oklahoma for liquor and gambling law violations, for which he was sentenced three years ago, but never paid the penalty, did not say whether he intended to wind up his journey at Oklahoma City or not.

Will Stay in Canada
There are rumors current that he has no such intentions.
Among those who believe he will not go to Oklahoma City at all are his two brothers, Fred and Sherman Billingsley, who are still here. "I believe," said Fred, "that Logan intends to remain in Canada for some time."

Two court cases were pending against Logan the day he left.
He was under bond to appear in police court in answer to a charge of violating the liquor law. This case was dismissed during the afternoon, to give precedence to the federal court case against Billingsley, and his bondsmen, one of whom was Clarence Gerald, former candidate for councilman, were released.
Bound Over to Jury
In federal court Billingsley was charged with dealing in morphine and cocaine.
This charge resulted from his arrest a week ago by Deputy Sheriffs Campbell and Madden, who confiscated two bottles that Billingsley was handing to a messenger boy, Ralph Johnson.

The United States commissioner, hearing Billingsley's plea of not guilty, bound him over on Monday afternoon to the grand jury in \$1,500 bonds.
Prepares for a Wait
At this juncture Sheriff Binion, who had been present at the hearing, left the court room and prepared to settle down to a longer sojourn.
He was given to understand, it is said, that Billingsley would be turned over to him in due time.
Shortly after Binion left, District Attorney Clay Allen informed the court that a chemical analysis of the "morphine and cocaine" showed them to be composed of nothing more narcotic than quinine mingled with powdered moth balls.
The case was at once dismissed. Billingsley, freed of his bonds, did not search out Sheriff Binion.
He took a train for the Dominion. And today there is a badly disappointed Oklahoma sheriff down at the Butler hotel.

And a disappointed prosecuting attorney and United States district attorney who declare they believe the "dope" case was all an elaborate frameup.

TO QUIT NAMIQUIPA
EL PASO, June 7.—Namiquipa, the present southern base of the American army in Mexico, will be abandoned before the end of June in favor of El Valle, according to reliable information today. Three regiments are reported already moving northward.




Upper picture shows Pavlova in scene from "The Dumb Girl of Portici," at the Coliseum.

DISCUSS PORT SETTLEMENT
