Something to do with Delaware, I think, or is it Rhode Island? Who is John W. Weeks? Somebody told me he ran for office somewhere once, but I've forgotten what it was.

Who is this man they call Brumbaugh, or something like that? I heard a man say he used to be mayor of Philadelphia. Who is W. J. Calhoun? Echo answers, "Who?" and that with sad and wailing voice.


