

Complete Instructions Issued for Preparedness Parade

Good Weather Promised for Mammoth Demonstration; Parade Will Break All Records; G. A. R. Veterans Invited to Review Parade From Stand at the Library.

With predictions of "fair weather" for Saturday, the preparedness parade officials are clearing up details Friday in preparation for the giant demonstration.

The final estimate on the number of marchers is 50,000. Divisions will start forming at 1:30 p. m.

The parade will start at 2 p. m. Detailed assignments of marchers and floats are all included in the general order issued by Capt. A. P. S. Hyde, chief marshal.

Arrangements were made Friday to seat all civil war veterans who cared to review the parade, on a platform which will be constructed in front of the public library, on Fourth ave., between Spring and Madison sts.

Special orders have been approved at Washington, D. C., which will permit postoffice employees to take part in the parade.

All daughters of veterans in the civil war, whether or not members of a "tent," will be included in the line of march if they go to Veterans' hall, in the Armory, at 12:30 p. m.

Secretary Watson, of the American legion, has announced that all men eligible for membership, whether or not they have received cards, will be welcome to march. They will assemble on Virginia st., between First and Western aves., at 1:30.

State Director A. O. Powell, of the industrial preparedness branch of the naval consulting board, announced Friday that all military, mechanical, electrical, mining and civil engineers, and all chemists, are invited to meet on Bell street, east of First avenue, Saturday at 1:30. They will march in the professional engineers and chemists' section of the parade.

The sequel to Seattle's preparedness parade Saturday will be "open house" at the Puget sound navy yard at Bremerton Sunday.

The Bremerton Commercial Club parade committee came here Thursday, and after registering a delegation of 2,000 marchers, issued a general invitation to Seattle to the navy yard.

The battleships and cruisers will be dressed up for the occasion. The Pacific submarine flotilla, with the mothership Cheyenne, will be brought alongside the docks for the inspection of the crowd.

Following is the general order, given out by the committee Friday:

RACE TO LA CONNER

On June 24 more than a dozen power boats will start from Seattle and race to La Conner as one of the events of the latter city's mid-summer festival. A silver trophy will be awarded the winner.

The reviewing stands will be located on the court of the Hotel Washington Annex, on Second ave., and the terrace of the public library, on Fourth ave.
