## MANLY SUMS UP HIS CASE FOR U. S. AGAINST INCOME TAX THIEVES

YOU—the American people—are the jury. Your decision must now be rendered, and your verdict enforced by your representatives in congress and the treasury department.

The evidence shows in brief: Evasion of taxes amounting in the aggregate to more than THREE HUNDRED AND TWENTY MILLION DOLLARS.

Every dollar of this enormous total is NEEDED at once by the federal government to pay the cost of preparedness and those great measures of social service which are essential for real national efficiency.

Five millions are not collected from the tax thieves the PEOPLE—you—will have to pay at the rate of SIXTEEN DOLLARS FOR EVERY AMERICAN FAMILY.

Not only is the evidence conclusive regarding the enormous size of these frauds but the IDENTITY of the thieves has in large measure been revealed.

The thieves who have stolen these millions from the treasury are, as a class, the same men who, for the past quarter century, have monopolized the land and natural resources of our nation, concentrating the ownership and control of American corporations in the hands of a FEW, and, by marking up the prices of commodities so that they are now nearly 100 per cent higher than in 1896, have drained into their own coffers the results of America's unparalleled productive capacity.

THE GREAT TAX THIEVES ARE THE AMERICAN MULTI-MILLIONAIRES.

The evidence tends to show that in one case alone—the estate of L. V. Harkness—the published facts indicate evasions involving in taxes and penalties more than ONE MILLION DOLLARS.

The evidence tends to show the Rockefeller Foundation as a device by which John D. Rockefeller has escaped taxation upon more than FIVE MILLION DOLLARS of his annual income.

The evidence reveals the ineffectiveness of the existing income tax law and shows the great loopholes left by "jokers" in the act thru which hundreds of millions of dollars have so far succeeded in avoiding taxation.

The utter inadequacy both in numbers and ability of the treasury department's collection force is clearly revealed.

Not only is there only one income tax agent for each 500,000 of the population, but \$1,800-clerks are pitted against the shrewdest lawyers and most skillful accountants in the nation.

The treasury department's examining system is also defective in that it detects only the tax losses arising from clumsiness and ignorance and is powerless to prevent or expose cunning and deliberate fraud.

## PLAN INQUEST IN MURDER OF SISTERS SOON

## Work of "Auctioneer-Statesmen" Cause of Reports That Country Goes One Way, Then Another

NEW YORK, June 2.—For Sale—One Balkan state, with a war machine that has never been used, also a navy suitable for excursions on the Danube!

This advertisement does not appear in newspapers of Rumania, for one reason because prospective buyers have been bidding in Bucharest ever since the outbreak of the war.

Carol, who was then king of Rumania, attempted as a Hohenzollern to hand his country over immediately to the central powers, but having made his deal, he found himself unable to deliver the goods because the majority of his ministers, the great mass of the Rumanian people and 98 per cent of the army officers were opposed to any alliance with Germany and Austria-Hungary.

ASK FOR BIDS  
Taking full advantage of the situation created by King Carol's death and the course of the war a certain group of Rumanians let us call them "statesmen" instead of auctioneers—have quietly sat in their high places, asking for bids.

So the daily cable reports from the seat of the great Balkan auction announce that Rumania is going, one day on this side, the next day on that side.

Meanwhile Germans and Austrians keep on working their way, which is to say, buying their way, from the seats of the mighty in Bucharest to minor officials in the country districts.

Austrian and German agents have not only flooded the country with pamphlets as a part of their campaign of propaganda, but own several newspapers and have subsidized numerous other publications.

It is said that since July, 1914, the Germans have spent almost \$10,000,000 influencing Rumanian opinion by pamphlets and newspapers and handshakes.

A COSTLY BUSINESS  
It was not merely public grip in Bucharest that before the Germans succeeded in getting direct railway communication Turkey via Serbia the state of ammunition and gunpowder in Rumania, billed as "agricultural machinery" or nothing but one hand's work for another.

From an official report I learned that the payment of \$500,000 changed hands in Rumania last summer at a critical period in Turkish military affairs when Germany found it absolutely necessary to get thru to Constantinople ten cars of war materials.

However, for fear some may think I am laying too much emphasis on the financial side of Rumanian "neutrality," I will give the only notable exception: "agricultural machinery."

ALL the educated people of Bucharest speak French, and they prefer it to the Rumanian language.

They also sing in French, and one of their favorite songs is the "Marseillaise."

"You are violating your neutrality," said the German agents in Bucharest to the Rumanian ministers, "by allowing the people to sing the national song of the French."

The cabinet gathered in solemn assemblage and considered the matter. They agreed that the Germans were correct, and so the king and the ministers issued a proclamation to the effect that the singing of the "Marseillaise" was a violation of Rumania neutrality and that it would be punished as such.

And so you have Rumanian "neutrality" and neutrality. If there is a choice, take it for Rumania is going, going—

**TWO TESTS FOR ANY CIGARETTE**

The taste of the cigarette—according to a leading tobacco journal—is up to the smoker. But there are other qualities that you should look for in the cigarette that you are going to stick to for your life. Here are a couple of tests that may help the average smoker to choose more wisely between different kinds of cigarettes.

The first test is for coolness, which means more comfort to the throat and tongue. Light cigarettes. Draw in a cloud of smoke—a small, ordinary puff is not sufficient to make this test.
