An Open Letter to Organized Labor

At its Convention, held in Seattle last May, the Pacific Coast Division of the International Longshoremen's Association adopted a schedule of wages and working conditions, to take effect June 1st, 1916. This action by the Longshore Convention deliberately violated an existing agreement between the International Longshoremen's Association and the Waterfront Employers' Union of Puget Sound, which agreement was duly signed on August 24th, 1915, by J. A. Madsen, L. E. Merritt and M. E. Wright, Puget Sound District Committee, representing the Locals of the International Longshoremen's Association of Puget Sound.

This new schedule was not voted upon by all the longshore delegates, but was railroaded thru the convention by a bunch of radicals during the last few days, after nearly all of the California delegates had left for home.

By this action of its convention, violating and disregarding its formal written agreement, the International Longshoremen's Association not only disgraced and discredited itself, but brought odium and disgrace upon organized labor in general. Employers and the public are justified in believing that if one labor union will openly and flagrantly violate its agreement, others may do the same—hence, why make agreements with labor unions if they are to be of no effect or are to be considered as binding upon one side only?

Unfortunately for its own reputation, the Washington State Federation of Labor stultified itself by indorsing this dishonest action of the Longshore Association, notwithstanding every officer of the federation who has been heard to express himself on the subject in private, has unhesitatingly condemned it. The federation should purge itself of this stain upon its reputation by rescinding its action at an early date. Otherwise, the organization will stand convicted in the public mind of having connived at and approved a dishonest and disreputable action on the part of an affiliated union.

The men who were responsible for this dishonest action on the part of the longshore union, and who have since attempted to defend it, have still further discredited themselves by the weakness and futility of their one excuse, which is, that they did not change the existing agreement with the employers, but simply canceled and annulled it—that is to say, they did not break their agreement, they just ignored it. This excuse was so unsavory that it disgusted Secretary of Labor W. B. Wilson and provoked him into denouncing the longshoremen's action in scathing terms in a telegram to J. A. Madsen, published recently in Seattle papers. It is a well-known fact that Secretary Wilson is an ex-labor leader and inclined to favor the union side of all questions.

It is unbelievable that a majority of the rank and file of the union longshoremen were in favor of breaking faith in this way with their employers. All honest and well-meaning union men, longshoremen as well as others, should show their disapproval of this crooked and dishonest work by insisting upon its immediate correction or otherwise sever their connection or affiliation with the union that stands for it.

Water Front Employers' Union

MOOSE INDORSE HUGHES, 32 TO 6

CHICAGO, June 27.—After a stormy session, the progressive national committee voted yesterday to indorse Charles E. Hughes for president. Nine members refused to vote. The vote was 32 to 6 in favor of indorsing Hughes.

George W. Perkins led the majority fight. Bainbridge Colby of New York wanted the committee to name Victor Murdock of Kansas as the party's presidential candidate to take the place of Roosevelt. The proposition to run a third party ticket was defeated, 31 to 15.

Austin E. Griffiths, committee man from Washington, reported that a majority of his constituents favored a third party fight.

FAMILIES NOT TO GET U. S. AID

WASHINGTON, June 27.—The house today, by a vote of 119 to 8, disapproved the action of the senate in eliminating the provision of the Hay resolution to grant \$50 a month to dependents of the militiamen.

WELLS WINS IN SUIT AGAINST BLETHEN

Hulet M. Wells, employe of the city lighting department and former socialist candidate for mayor, got a \$500 verdict Monday in a libel action against the Blethen Printing Co., concluded after three days' legal fighting in Superior Judge Albertson's court.

The suit was based on an article published October 18, 1914, in which Wells was branded "a coward, defamer of the country's flag, sympathizer with the I. W. W. gang."

HANSON TELLS MOOSE TO STICK

Statements calling upon Washington progressives to support Charles E. Hughes for president were issued Tuesday by State Chairman L. Roy Slater of Spokane, and County Chairman J. Y. C. Kellogg, after a conference in Seattle.

Ole Hanson, progressive candidate for U. S. senator in 1914, issued the following statement: "There appears to be a concerted effort on the part of certain politicians and newspapers to stampede the progressives of this state into the republican party. The old battle cry of the Grand Old Party has been raised from every office seeker's lips; those who desire 'peace at any price' are using the phone and writing letters in order to disrupt the progressive organization of this state. That is probably good politics for the man who thinks more of securing office than he does of his progressive principles."

"Personally, I desire to say that I can see no necessity of deserting our cause at this time. Woodrow Wilson, our worthy president, is confronting problems today as serious almost as confronted Lincoln at the beginning of the civil war."

"Back in Washington, he is fighting the battles of the people of this nation; night and day he is thinking and planning for you and for me."

"It is not a time for partisan politics or attacks on our president. 'As American citizens, as progressives, it is our duty at this time to silence the harsh criticisms and unthinking partisan prejudice and stand by our president.'"

"It is a long time before November. We will have plenty of time to come to a mature, righteous decision as to what is best to do long before then. Don't let us be stampeded."

"If it is necessary to get aboard some other vessel later, the progressives and not the office seekers in their ranks will choose the ship and become part of the crew, not cabin passengers, with their fare paid by some other partisan ship organization."

RATES TO COAST ORDERED RAISED

WASHINGTON, June 27.—An order taking away from the Pacific Coast cities the advantage they now enjoy over intermediate cities in transcontinental rates was issued by the Interstate Commerce Commission today.

Slides in the Panama canal and the transfer of practically all of the vessels heretofore in the coast-to-coast trade to the ocean trade as the result of the war have removed the water competition, the commission held, that formerly justified granting lower rates to coast cities.

The commission's previous order finding coast cities entitled to the advantage was rescinded, effective Sept. 1, and transcontinental carriers directed to file new schedules. The order applies to a wide range of commodities of domestic commerce, ranging from articles of food, to iron and steel from Pittsburgh.

MAY CALL MILITIA IN TACOMA STRIKE

TACOMA, June 27.—Whether state troops shall be called out to guard the water front here to prevent a repetition of last night's rioting during which three men were shot, will be decided by Gov. Lister, who left Olympia for this city shortly before noon today to personally investigate the longshoremen's strike situation.

None of the troops now in the American lake mobilization camp will be used, however. There are several hundred men in the coast artillery and naval militia who are subject to call when needed.

WILL FEDERALIZE THE NAVAL MILITIA

WASHINGTON, June 27.—The house naval affairs committee today reported out a bill for the federalization of the naval militia, the principal features of which have been indorsed by the administration. It enables the president to draft the men, of whom there are about 9,000.
