JOE WOULD NOT GIVE 'EM SYRUP

Cannon Advises U. S. Establish Military Protectorate in Mexico

HE RAPS PRES. WILSON

WASHINGTON, June 28.—President Wilson's handling of the Mexican problem is "dilly wally, wishy washy, hog wallow policy," Uncle Joe Cannon today declared in the house. If he were president, he said, he would establish a military government in Mexico City and support it by force until a Mexican could be found who could maintain peace and order.

"God knows I don't want Mexico," shouted Cannon. "I don't think we need it, but we can't get anywhere by feeding soothing syrup to bandits."

"Wouldn't you make Mexico, with all its wealth, pay for the great expenditure we would undergo in pacifying that country?" asked Taggart of Kansas.

"Well, we can settle that when the time comes," answered Cannon. The debate was precipitated by consideration of emergency appropriations of \$25,000,000 for the army and navy.



The heavy black lines and crescents indicate the position of the Mexicans, who nearly surround the U. S. troops.
