QUIZ ROBERTS IN JAIL ESCAPE

Olympia Authorities Trying to Find Who Assisted Them

TELLS OF DISGUISES

OLYMPIA, Aug. 1.—Henry Roberts was taken from his cell in the county jail here today and given a thoro "sweating" by authorities, who said they were trying to find out who helped him and J. F. Gillies, state insurance fund looter, to escape from prison the night of July 8.

Roberts was brought back here Monday from Brighton, Col., where he was recaptured shortly before Gillies was caught at Key West, Fla.

"I'm glad Gillies is caught," he said. "Telling of their flight as far as he accompanied Gillies, Roberts said he gave his companion a pair of heavy spectacles, false whiskers and made a dipper in his shirt. Even former acquaintances passed them in the train without noticing them.

Roberts said he believed he might have evaded escape had it not been for a hook the town marshal at Brighton found in his grip which contained the names and addresses of a number of girls living near Olympia.

"That town marshal," he said, "is too smart. He said he became suspicious of me because he thought I was too good a waiter for a small town like Brighton."

Gillies left the train somewhere in Oregon, Roberts said, while he was asleep. When he awoke, he, too, got off and found later that Gillies had bought a ticket for a point in Nebraska.
