Will Celebrate Catholic Week With Pontifical High Mass

TO HAVE CHAUTAUQUA

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—Twenty-five thousand Catholics, from all parts of the country, are here for Catholic week, which will open tomorrow. The Catholic Press association and the German Catholic Central Verein are holding meetings today.

Forty thousand have asked for cards of admission to the pontifical high mass to be held at St. Patrick's cathedral tomorrow.

Altho the church seats but 8,000, arrangements have been made to accommodate an additional 2,000. Three cardinals will preside at the mass.

It is proposed that the coming seasons of the American Federation of Catholic Societies will try to agree on a universal practical program, which may result in the organization of a national Catholic Chautauqua.

Members of the various organizations have placed a ban on partisan politics, and declare the federation will not permit any discussions which may result in strife.

ENJOINS CITY BANKS ON INTEREST RATES

Thirteen of the largest Seattle banking houses were enjoined, Saturday, by Superior Judge Jury, from carrying into effect an alleged conspiracy to reduce the annual rate of interest on commercial and savings deposits in this city from 4 to 3 per cent.

The injunction also blocks what Edward C. Neufelder, president of the People's Savings bank, alleges was a scheme to force his bank out of the Seattle Clearing House association at noon Saturday, by dissolving the association and reorganizing without his house as a member.

Accepting the sworn statement of Edward Brady, an attorney, who testified before the board of equalization this week, there is \$92,000,000 lying idle in Seattle banks.

A reduction of 1 per cent on the interest rate paid on commercial and savings deposits would amount to somewhere between \$500,000 and \$1,000,000 a year, which the depositors would not receive, it is believed.

Exonerates Two President Neufelder brought suit against the Seattle Clearing House association, M. F. Backus, its president, and J. W. Spangler, secretary, as well as 15 member banks of the association, Saturday.

The banks named defendants are: The First National, American Savings Bank and Trust Co., Bank of California, Canadian Bank of Commerce, Dexter Horton National, Dexter Horton Trust and Savings bank, Metropolitan National Bank of Commerce, National City bank,

DIVER SINKS ITALIAN TROOP SHIP, REPORT

NEW YORK, Aug. 19.—The Italian steamer Stampalla, formerly in service as a passenger liner between New York and Italian ports, but more recently engaged as a troop transport, has been sunk, presumably by a submarine, according to reports received by her agents here today.

The Stampalla steel twin screw steamer of 8,000 tons reached Genoa on July 30, from New York, and was scheduled to sail from New York on the return voyage on August 26.

Local agents of the line received notice 15 days ago to cancel all bookings for the return trip to Genoa, as the steamer had been taken over by the Italian government as a transport.

The Stampalla was owned by the La Veloce Navigation Co., of Genoa. She was built in 1901 and was 476 feet long, with a beam of 55.8 feet.
