25 MILLION MERGER TO BOOST CANNING

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 23.—With the pooling of a majority of stock of the Alaska Packers' association, the formation of a gigantic \$25,000,000 corporation by merging the principal fruit canning companies of the West with the big fish concern, is so near a certainty today that Frank B. Anderson, in charge of the plan, will leave Friday for New York to perfect final arrangements and complete the deal.

The fruit canners represented in the merger are:
California Fruit Cannery's association, Central California Canneries company, Griffin & Skelly, and J. K. Arnsby company.

Those making the combination say the plan is for a defensive trade organization, owing to other large concerns entering the fruit and fish canning business. It will make it possible to meet the Eastern concern on equal terms.

The merger will enable the new company to keep the Alaska Fish Packers' large fleet of ships in operation. After the close of salmon packing it is planned to have these vessels carry the fruit and fish products to the East and England via the Panama canal.

GERMAN COUNTER ATTACKS WIN

PARIS, Aug. 23.—German troops made a powerful attack, last night, on trenches south of the Somme, south of Estrées and west of Soyecourt, which were captured by the French in Tuesday's fighting, and succeeded in penetrating the French line at several points, it was officially admitted today.

The attack was preceded by an intense bombardment, lasting several hours, in which the whole French front south of the Somme was under steady fire.

North of the Somme the Germans maintained a fierce bombardment of French first line and communicating trenches, but there were no infantry attacks.

In the Voges, French grenade parties repulsed an attempted surprise attack on Hartmannswellerkopf.

The French flyer Dorn downed his fifth German aeroplane yesterday. Northeast of Peronne, French flyers with machine guns attacked four German planes, which landed behind their own lines, seriously damaged.

BOAT LOST IN \$10,000 BLAZE

Fire, starting after a tarpot boiled over, did \$10,000 damage on the water front, at 15th ave. W. and Emerson st., Tuesday afternoon.

The fishing schooner Salamo, owned by H. Smith and valued at \$4,500, was totally destroyed, with a newly constructed shed at the north end of the port commission's fishermen's dock, a scow and houseboat belonging to Peter Ashland, and fish nets and seines belonging to Jen Jensen.

Swenson & Co., contractors, had finished the \$3,500 shed and were putting on roofing when the tarpot boiled over.

ITALIAN - AMERICANS TAKE PART IN THE CAPTURE OF GORITZ

WITH THE ITALIAN ARMY AT GORITZ, Aug. 23.—Several thousand Italian-Americans were in the army that entered Goritz and are now storming the Austrian defenses south and east of the captured fortress city. Many of them were killed and wounded.

Upon entering Goritz I met several Italian-Americans, including Luciano Abbate and Gianni Jennare, former New York street car men, now rapid fire gunners with an armored auto squadron. Both were eager for news of America.

King Victor Emmanuel is constantly at the front, encouraging his troops, regardless of all personal risk. He was in Goritz when the city was heavily bombarded by the Austrians from Mont Marco and surrounding heights.

Goritz is under martial law, but the 7,500 remaining civilians are gradually resuming their normal life. The Italians are throwing up strong fortifications to make sure that the Austrians do not recapture the city before they can push on with a vigorous offensive.

Both south and east of Goritz Gen. Cadorna's lines are being gradually advanced, but at some places under the greatest difficulties. Austrian positions on the heights surrounding Goritz are defended by rows of electrically charged barbed wire.
