Hall declared he was in the best of shape and would limit his workouts in Everett to a little boxing and work in the gym. He has worked hard and faithfully for his mix with the fast lad from San Francisco and if hard work can gain him the Pacific Coast bantamweight championship, it will be his following the four-round encounter with Gorman.

The bout between the two bantams has caused more talk in local pugilistic circles than any staged in the Northwest in many moons. Hall has many admirers among the local fans and there will be a large delegation boosting for him at the ringside following the tap of the gong on Labor Day afternoon.

SPEED AND KNOWING HOW WILL CARRY HIM THRU, SAYS FREDDIE

COLORADO SPRINGS, Aug. 30.—Speed and ring generalship acquired in more than 150 bouts form the combination Freddie Welsh says will carry him thru the lines at Denver, Labor day, when he defends his lightweight title against Charlie White.

The world's champion, in training at Colorado Springs, realizes the importance of perfect physical condition for the scrap. There's something that suggests seriousness in the attitude he assumes when he dons his gym togs—something even his closest pals never noticed during the last two years.

"Yes, I am serious about this match," said the Briton. "It's the first time in 26 months I have gone 20 rounds, and, naturally, I am anxious about it. "While I believe I can beat White over the route, you must not forget that I have a lot of respect for him. He is a heavy hitter, and, as they say on the baseball field, 'it only takes one.'"

That Welsh is training conscientiously is evident from the fact that only a few days after he pitched camp in Denver he hopped on the scales, and, in the presence of the official sealer of weights of Denver, tipped the beam at 129 1/2 pounds.

Freddie, at 31 years of age, is facing the most dangerous puncher in his division.

Wherever boxing enthusiasts rather, the questions advanced is: "Can Welsh go 20 rounds?"

The champion answers "Yes." "The idea which has settled in the minds of many is that the champion is essentially a sprinter, geared only for 10-round no-decision affairs, it's a fact that Welsh's greatest work has been done in mills waged over a route.
