**BLOODY SHIRT IS DEATH CLUE**

Portland Murder Mystery Hinges on Identity of Garment

**WAS DOUBLE KILLING**

HILLSBORO, Ore., Sept. 8.—A blood-stained shirt formed the principal link today in the chain of circumstantial evidence by which the state is attempting to convict Bennett Thompson of murder.

The garment was found near the Gore ranch, where Mrs. Helen Jennings and Fred Ristman, a jitney driver, were killed last May.

It is alleged that Thompson, a ranch hand, hired Ristman to drive him from Portland to the house where Mrs. Jennings was slain as she slept by a blow on the head from a sledge hammer. The prosecution claims that Thompson then killed Ristman to keep him from telling. The chauffeur's skull was smashed with a monkey wrench.

The bloody shirt found near the murder farm, according to state witnesses, was originally given by Mrs. Ethel Clark, of Lentz, to Mrs. Clara Lyon, her sister-in-law. Mrs. Lyon gave it to Mrs. Jas. Thompson, who is also the accused man's sister-in-law. Thompson lived with his brother and sister-in-law before the killings.

There was a break in this line of testimony when Mrs. Lyon refused to say whether the shirt in evidence was the one she received from Mrs. Clark and passed along to Mrs. Thompson.

H. X. Johnson, one of the most important state witnesses, identified Thompson as the man he saw talking to Ristman, the jitney driver, in Portland, the night before the murder.

On cross-examination, he admitted he might be mistaken in this identification.


