
Several of the successful candidates for nomination in the primaries have filed expense affidavits.

trousers, a white vest, ten times my size, and the biggest clawhammer coat that I have ever seen.

"I'll make you up just like I fix myself," he chuckled, "and you will be Young John Alton!"

He did. A false embonpoint, blown full of air, was suspended from my neck. Cold cream was smeared over my face and ears. White powder followed. Then came the red on the end of my nose, and the grotesque red lower lip, and little black lines, splitting my eyelids, which John marked with a match smeared with black grease paint.

The final touch was the black, telescoped stovepipe hat, pulled tight to my ears, on the back of my head.

I glanced into the glass and learned that, no matter how solemn I tried to look, John's artful makeup lines kept the same silly, smirking expression dominant on my face.

Clowns were everywhere by this time. We could hear the band under the big top, and the ladies, who dressed on the other side of the canvas drop, were walking out to mount their horses for the grand entre.

John took me out near the entrance curtain with him, and the performers would look first at John, and then at me, made up and dressed just like him.

"You looked that young once," one woman leaned from her horse and said to him, smiling.

"When I was his age I had to do talking stunts from the center of the ring," he said.

When the frisky lion, with an acrobat inside, cartwheeled out into the big arena, followed by half a dozen yelling clowns and a grotesque trainer with a blacksnake whip, I was the guy who got chased up onto the platform.

And I was the guy you saw (if you were at the circus) carrying the pick in the preparedness parade!

And I worked in the "stops," which is show talk for the intervals between bareback stunts. When I leaned low, another clown hit me with a barrel stave, and it made such a loud report that all the little boys and girls, sitting wide-eyed in front of me, laughed.

Every summer day, of every year, these solemn fellows with the powdered faces, live for these few minutes filled with child laughs.

It is the supreme sensation for them, followed by the satisfaction of service well performed.

I could tell from dressing room conversation that they were vexed when one stunts barely "got over."

"They must all be performers in that section," one of them sneered; "no kids at all."

Nobody recognized me, I am sure. Despite the fact that the city editor had inserted a box in the paper giving away the secret that I was to play clown, and offering tickets to anyone who would recognize me from the rest, nothing approaching recognition happened.

Joe Mason, police lieutenant, and Capt. Willard, who I see every day at police headquarters, were standing in the entrance.

I went over and stood next to them, with three other clowns.

I even bumped into Joe. But he couldn't see thru the white powder and the red paint.

It seems that jealousy is about the only virulent pest that plays on these show people.

"We are just like one big family, eating, working and traveling together," explained Harold De Goro, gymnast, whose wife is a performer, and whose 11-year-old boy is a clown.

But there was no profanity. There is a \$10 fine to be paid by the man who uses it for wives, mothers and daughters are just beyond the canvas.

Homey Hobson, Jr., age 18, clown, and son of the riding Hobsons, was my friend from the start.

"That's my mother," he pointed from the doorway. "She and dad have had me on the road since I was 12. She can turn a somersault in the air, riding, just like men do."

I mention them all, because they are all regular fellows, who would be liked, no matter where they went, and who made the experience interesting to me.

Just as I got ready to go, John Alton, the boss clown, took me to a secluded spot outside the dressing room.

"I just want to ask one favor of you," he said, very seriously. "Tell the people who read The Star that the boss clown of this show wants a wife."

I agreed, and noted that he was confused.

"You know," he said, "I've been doing this work a long, long time. That's all."

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'TIS COLD NOW IN ARGENTINE

'Tis August, and the wintry wind
Blows bleak and chill and unconfined;
Carlotta hugs the hearth's scant ember
And longs for balmy, bright December,
With roses, warmth and skies serene
In Buenos Aires, Argentine.

BUENOS AIRES, Argentine, Aug. 15.—(By Mail.)—It may seem strange to be shivering in a fur coat in August, but not when you add—in Buenos Aires.

Not only are the seasons reversed down here in the Argentine, but the sun is a bit turned around as well. This a young North American matron found out to her sorrow. Looking for rooms, she insisted on having southern exposure and was astonished with the facility with which she got the desired outlook. After she had signed the lease and moved in, she found that the sun perversely showered all its golden favors on her more sagacious neighbor, whose windows faced the north.

Reveling in eight perfectly good months of warmth and sunshine, the native Argentinian has taken to ignoring the four cold months disdainfully. He treats them Christianly, and for him the chill does not exist. Hence all the buildings are built with a weather eye to summer only and heating facilities are as rare as a day in June or an underdone steak.

As a matter of fact, the thermometer never registers much lower here than on some of our own crisp autumn days in the United States. It is just the tomb-like chill of the unheated buildings that gives this here frapped effect.

With coal at 44 gold dollars a ton these days, this lack of steam heat is all most fortunate for the native son and daughter.
