PARLEY MAY HELP PREVENT GOAL WAR  
Washington coal miners and mine operators will reopen negotiations here Tuesday in hope of reaching a wage agreement to avert a strike called for October 1 unless a 5 per cent increase has been granted.

DISTRACTED AND DISCOURAGED.  
A.—Do not give up your children. If the situation becomes unbearable, go to the proper official in your county and ask that your husband be restrained from such conduct and be compelled to support his children. This course may effect a change in the man.

Q.—I would like your advice about a little love affair. I have been going with a young lady for over a year. We recently had a falling out, really thru no fault of either of us, but thru her parents.
