GIRL PARALYZED 10 YEARS SWIMS LIKE A MERMAID; TAKEN TO LAKE IN WHEEL CHAIR



CHICAGO, Sept. 18.—Dorothy Nevin, 14, paralyzed in her legs for ten years, takes a daily dip in Lake Michigan and swims as gracefully as a mermaid. Dorothy is wheeled to the beach in a chair by chums, carried to the water's edge, and helped into the water. She swims with a crawl stroke, in which her legs are not used, which she learned from her brother. She also dives from a kneeling position as boldly as other divers. "It's wonderful to feel that I can move again all by myself after spending ten years in an invalid chair," says the invalid.

COMPOSER OF JAPANESE ANTHEM DEAD

TOKIO, Sept. 18.—Franz Eckert, composer of the music of the Japanese national anthem, is dead. The authorship of the "Kimigayo," Japan's "Star-Spangled Banner," is disputed, but Japanese authorities admit this Teuton had a claim upon the song's composition. Eckert, it is known here today, died recently in Seoul, Korea. He was 64. When foreign music first was introduced into Japan, in 1877, he was one of the leaders in establishing its popularity in Tokio and other leading cities of the empire. At first Eckert was attached to the navy office, but later was transferred to court, where he succeeded an American named Penton as chief of the Western music of the court. In 1879 a number of compositions, from which one was to be selected as the national air of Japan, were submitted to the court musicians. According to one story, Eckert picked one written by a Japanese, "retouched" it, and sent it forth as the "Kimigayo" of today. It is generally conceded, however, that the greater part of the music was written by the German himself.

WILL PICK ON POOR HOOKWORM NOW

TOKIO, Japan, Sept. 18.—Dr. R. W. Mendelson of New York city is on his way from here to Siam today, as a representative of the United States war department, to take the laziness out of the Siamese by killing off their oversupply of hookworms. The government of Siam asked him to do it. After investigating the cause of so much laziness in Siam, the government decided it was the hookworm that caused it, and asked the war department to send a doctor to set the country right with industry and energy. Dr. Mendelson was one of the American physicians sent to Serbia to fight the typhus epidemic, early in 1915. After the fall of Belgrade, he made the retreat across Serbia with the regiment to which he was attached.

MAN, 72, FACES TRIAL FOR MURDER THAT WAS COMMITTED IN SOUTH 44 YEARS AGO

WILLIAMSON, W. Va., Sept. 18.—One night, 44 years ago, at a cane mill in Buncome county, N. C., somebody kicked J. C. Rogers' dog. A fight ensued, and Rogers was killed. Andrew Wise, 72, father of five children, who was present when Rogers was slain, today is waiting here for North Carolina sheriffs to take him back South to face trial for the murder. Wise has lived in various parts of the South since the murder and says he has never worried about it. He says he is innocent. "I did not know I was wanted for murder," said Wise, after his arrest. "For years I have corresponded with relatives in Buncome county." Several men who witnessed the murder have died since.

TEUTON JABBERWOK MARKET HITS SKIDS

LONDON, Sept. 1.—(By Mail).—Germany's jabberwok market has hit the skids. "The birds and the beasts were there" when Gen. Smuts grabbed most of German East Africa, and the kaiser's colonialists fled. A blood-sweating behemoth doesn't give a darn what flag flies on his hunting ground. Neither does a dik-dak, or a whiffenpoof, or a man-eating piffik. So Germany is cut off from her zoological supply. The first shipment of animals is here from the new British territory today, consigned to E. H. Bostock. Twenty-five baboons goose-stepped at least about the decks, with still a shadow of German accent in their chatter. Six porcupines with fixed bayonets held a small hollow square, and 400 birds screeched while a pair of secretary birds made notes for reference. "The Germans will never regain their animal trade," said Bostock today.

PERFECT 36 MODELS PARADE IN CHI

CHICAGO, Sept. 18.—New styles in milady's corsets, gowns and dresses were on exhibition here today, at the annual autumn convention of the Fashion Art League of America. "Perfect 36" models paraded in their corsets and prettiness before delegates of the convention to show their "36-ness," and how the new styles should be worn. The styles ranged from hoops to hobbles and low necks to high. The fashion makers will select the new styles from this assortment. A silver loving cup will be presented to the designer of the best-made tailored suit. Competition for this cup is keen.

MIDDLE WEST CATTLE ARE ON DISPLAY

KANSAS CITY, Mo., Sept. 18.—With all the champion Holstein and Jersey cattle in the Middle West, and some from the East, on exhibition, the annual Southwest Dairy show opened at Convention hall today. More than 500 of the best milk-producing cows in the country are housed in the hall. During the show, various dairy appliances will be demonstrated. Government experts also will explain the latest dairy experiment results.

PROHIBITIONIST RUNS FOR SHERIFF

MISSOULA, Mont., Sept. 18.—J. W. Jones, a prohibitionist, and the one best rifle shot in the state, became county sheriff today. He was elected without opposition last month. In view of a lack of opponents, county officials tried to get him to put his name on some other ticket, for, it being Montana, there were no other prohibition aspirants. That would have saved the county \$80. But Jones wouldn't do it.

SAN FRANCISCO, Sept. 18.—Elk love laughs at locksmiths and carpenters. At Golden Gate park Zoo today, Reno, pride of the elk herd, leaped an 11-foot fence, which barred him from his mate.
