PASTOR AND BRIDE TO LIVE ON FAITH--- AND \$8 EACH WEEK

PASADENA, Cal., Sept. 19.—A man and a girl here intend to marry and live on faith and eight dollars a week.

Rev. Paul J. Goodwin, 20-year-old pastor, and Ruth Ball, his fiancée, are the ones who are planning this adventure against the high cost of living. They firmly believe that a great love and their trust in religion will help them to success in the venture.

"Faith in God will sustain us," says the young minister. "Yes, faith in the Lord is entirely sufficient," echoes the bride-to-be. "Tis better to have faith in God than to possess millions, for God bestows all the riches of heaven, and what more can one ask?"

"We all know that a preacher's salary is not large," added Goodwin, "but neither are his needs. We will have a cozy little parsonage hid amid the trees, and no landlord will bother us, so we ought to be able to meet all other requirements on eight dollars a week. We love God, not the world's luxuries, and therefore our needs will be small."

There will be no servants in the Goodwin household—not on eight dollars a week! The bride will do her own work. Cooking, sweeping, sewing—all the duties of housewifery will fall on her shoulders without being burdensome, for she received her domestic science diploma in her own home. Her mother was the tutor.

"Girls nowadays usually know too much of style and too little of economy," sagely remarked Miss Ball. "They think more of the designs of their new hat than they do of how they can reduce the cost of living. Forgetting to be Christians, they work hardships upon themselves."

"When I was 12 years old," Miss Ball continued, "I could well take care of a home. I had been trained to do the things that every girl should take pride in. I could cook and sew and attend to all other household duties. Why, I even made my own wedding dress. And long ago I learned the fundamentals of economy, and for this reason I know we will succeed in matrimony."

"What advice would I give other girls? This: To be a Christian; to get a thoro education. No young woman's education is complete if her domestic and religious training has been neglected. If she knows how to take care of her own home she will look for less dollars and more for happiness when she seeks a husband."

Miss Ball is 19 years old. She is the daughter of the former state architect of California, the man who designed Folsom prison. Here is a childhood romance. Together, she and the young preacher attended the Nazarene university at Pasadena. And when Goodwin was made pastor at Elysian Heights Nazarene church of Los Angeles at a salary of eight dollars a week, the two concluded that fortune had smiled upon them and the marriage license was the result.

GASOLINE SCARCE IN DEAR OLD LONDON

LONDON, Sept. 19.—If American motorists feel troubled over the cost of gas for their buzz cars, let them listen to the Britisheers' troubles and rejoice at their own good fortune.

The British private motor car owner is unable to get the gas he wants at any price. When German submarines began torpedoing the oil tank ships from the United States, the American oil men quit shipping it. Consequently, gasoline is so scarce in England that it is given out by card to car owners in very limited quantities.

Not only is the private motor car owner compelled to present his oil card whenever he wants to run his machine a few miles, but the little gas he gets is begrudged him.

The government has allowed 60 per cent of the amount of gas demanded by commercial car owners, 50 per cent of that asked for taxis, 25 per cent of the private motor owners' demand, and two gallons a month for motorcycles.

All evidences point to the doom of private motoring until after the war.

HELP PREVENT FIRES ON OCTOBER 9

OLYMPIA, Sept. 19.—Gov. Lister has set aside October 9 as "Fire Prevention" day. He urges that every factory and industrial site be cleaned of rubbish and fire traps on this day.

Every school is asked to conduct a fire drill, and a complete investigation of all wiring be made in the state, with a view to correcting flaws.

ASTORIA, Ore., Sept. 19.—State authorities admit that all attempts to obtain any evidence against the gasoline schooner *Tramp*, which has been selling liquor at the mouth of the Columbia river, have been failures. A close watch is being maintained for visitors to the vessel who bring more than the legal amount ashore.

SOMEBODY LOST A PERFECTLY GOOD VOTE

Somebody lost at least one good vote out in Precinct 36 last week. It was John Nims', of 6754 13th ave. N. W.

"Three months ago I went to the city hall and registered," he reports, "and when I went to the polls at the Whittier school, the election board said I wasn't registered. I looked on the book and couldn't find my name."

So, Monday, he hurried back to the registration office. "And there was my name on the fifth line," declares the indignant Mr. Nims. "There is evidently something rotten in Denmark again."

NEW DEATH ENGINES MADE IN PEORIA

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—The armored "tank" cars which have revolutionized the manner of fighting on the Somme front, in France, within the week were made, minus their armor, in Peoria, Ill. U. S. A. M. M. Baker, vice president of the Holt Manufacturing Co., of Peoria, says 1,000 caterpillar tractors were sold and delivered to the British government. They weigh 12,000 pounds, are built of steel, and crawl on corrugated belts.

WAYNESBURG, Pa., Sept. 19.—Mr. and Mrs. George C. Brewer, 14 and 15, respectively, returned to this city and started housekeeping today, with the distinction of being the youngest married couple in Pennsylvania.
