

DID YOUNG MAN AND AUTO LURE HIS WIFE AWAY?

Was it a husband's cruelty that drove Mrs. Robert Acton, 106 Blewett st., from her home, or was she lured away by the blandishments of George Keating, of Olympia, and his money, his gentlemanly manners and his automobile?

This is the riddle a jury in Superior Judge Frater's court must solve in settling the \$10,000 suit Acton began Tuesday for alleged alienation of his wife's affections.

Attorney Sam H. Steele opened his statement of the points he would attempt to prove in presenting Acton's case, with the declaration that Keating, "who is a much younger man than Mr. Acton, and fine looking, with an automobile, showered his attentions upon Mrs. Acton, resulting in the estrangement of the Actons, their separation, and a divorce."

"I will show," he said, "that for some time Keating and Mrs. Acton occupied the same apartment. "He would take her out for auto rides, the testimony will show, and later elsewhere, which conduct led up to the Actons' separation."

In stating the defendant's case, Judge A. E. Griffin said: "Keating never in the world visited the home of the Actons unless he was invited either by Acton or Mrs. Acton, and always went away with Acton inquiring why he waited for an invitation to come again. "When they went for auto rides, Mr. Acton accompanied them. Keating took both of them to Everett, Tacoma, Snoqualmie falls, and on rides about the boulevards repeatedly."

"Acton never made any suggestion that there was familiarity between Mrs. Acton and Keating until after he had choked and beaten her until she was black and blue."

"When that occurred, Mrs. Acton said she could stand his maltreatment no longer and consulted an attorney. They agreed to separate."

LONDON, Sept. 19.—Great battles between whole fleets of land dreadnaughts may result from the introduction of the new "tanks" or motor car monsters in the Somme fighting by the British, a Times correspondent at British headquarters suggested today.

"In one short hour," he said, "the tanks did more military

service and killed more Germans in uniform than all the Zeppelins have ever done. "It may be that before this war is done, we, the Germans and all the allies alike, shall be building other monsters, huger and each more horrible than the last until there will be land battles of whole fleets of dreadnaughts and terrestrial monsters."

TROOPS CLASH WITH NEGROES

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 19.—The negro section of Sacramento is practically under martial law today, following an attempt last night by members of the Fifth California Infantry to avenge the beating administered three of their members at the hands of a gang of negroes Sunday night. A provost guard is maintained and no soldiers allowed to enter the "colored zone."

The timely arrival of the police and a company of the Fifth prevented a clash late last night. Four hundred soldiers were congregated near the negro section and were about to rush three negro saloons when the police and the provost guard interfered.

The negro saloons are closed, and as a special precaution to quell a riot, a couple of machine guns are conveniently near.

Puts Big Tract of Logged-Off Lands on Market

One of the largest land deals recorded in Western Washington in recent years was closed this week when A. H. Reid & Company of this city acquired 1,400 acres of logged-off lands in Thurston county, which will be immediately opened to settlement. The land, which is located at Chambers Prairie, the junction point of the Northern Pacific and O.W. R. & N. railways, is quickly accessible to Seattle, Tacoma and other western Washington cities.

"Thurston County Farms" is the name given to the tract, which has been platted in tracts of five to thirty acres each. A townsite has been platted at Chambers Prairie station, immediately adjoining the small farms. This station is an important telegraph point for both railroads, and all main line trains stop here, including the limited.
