## PACKED HOUSE GREET'S ELMAN

Violinist's Wonderful Music Holds Audience Enraptured

### HE PLAYS OVERTIME

Punks crowded into the Moore theatre, sat on the stage, stood up in the rear and packed the balconies, boxes and gallery to hear Mischa Elman, world-famous Russian violinist, in the opening concert of the Ladies' Musical club's season Friday night.

Elman, older and more bald than before, evidently was impressed by Seattle's apparent love for his art. After each number, the crowd would not let him rest.

He would retire only to be called back time and time again. Each time he stood with head thrown back for a second, peering through half-closed eyes at the mass of humanity before him, and then bowed repeatedly or returned to play again.

Also many people socially prominent were in the audience, the majority was made up of plain, quietly appreciative folk.

At the completion of a program that gave Elman an opportunity to demonstrate his wonderful technique with difficult concertos and win more applause with hitting, sweet-toned shorter selections, the crowd kept seated—hesitating to start for home.

After a minute or so, while the applause continued, women began to put on their hats, and finally congest the aisles.

Elman then appeared, again, and started to play Dvorak's "Humoresque," which every audience seems to demand of a violinist, whether in cheap vaudeville or classic concert. In a second, the murmuring crowd was hushed and held motionless while he went through the entire composition.

## DR. ALLEN GETS A YEAR IN JAIL

"Dr." Percival Allen, recently convicted of unlawfully living as husband and wife with Anna M. Danielson, whose mysterious death led Prosecutor Lundin to prosecute, was sentenced Saturday by Superior Judge Prater to serve 12 months in the county jail and pay a fine of \$100.

Attorney Dorr moved for a new trial and a stay of execution, which was denied.

Dorr pleaded for clemency on the part of his client.

"I have seen men who have been found guilty of contributing to the delinquency of young girls," Dorr pleaded, "who have been let off with \$25 fines. In this case, Dr. Allen met a woman 35 years of age, with lots of money, and out hunting leisure. She was equally as guilty as he is, and I don't believe the sentence should be heavy."

Deputy Prosecutor Heisel in reply said: "This man has had three wives and has lived with a common law wife. He has served time in Illinois for burglary. He has no sexual morals. In this instance he promised the woman he would marry her, knowing he had a wife in California, just to get her to live with him in a hotel."

Dr. Allen was nervous while receiving sentence.

Post-mortem examination disclosed strychnine in the stomach and brain of Miss Danielson.

It was not determined if this was from the embalming fluid or from a dose administered before death.

Dr. Allen said she died from convulsions. He refused to testify during the trial.

## BOY, KIDNAPED SIX YEARS, MAY BE HERE

Believing that her grandson, Roy Bond, 11, kidnaped six years ago, is in some Seattle institution, Mrs. H. J. Rhodes of Sedro-Woolley today appealed for aid in locating him.

The boy, then five years old, was taken from his father's home in Sedro-Woolley by his mother, although the court had decreed the custody of the child to the father. Since then, it is reported, the mother has gone to Alaska leaving the boy in a home here. The boy may have been turned over to the institution before the war broke out. It would be interesting to know if the mother's maiden name.

## FIREFIGHTERS RIDE THRU BLAZING FIRE

PORT ANGELES, Sept. 30.—Fifty forest fire fighters, hemmed in between two burning bridges, mounted an engine and rode thru flames and smoke over a blazing bridge to safety at the Puget Sound Mills & Timber company's logging camp No. 5 yesterday. Many of them were blistered, temporarily blinded and sick from breathing smoke when they arrived here. They had fought the fire for 36 hours, only to see it destroy 18 buildings.

Herman Koedel, a member of the submarine Deutschland's crew, is the last surviving member of a "little German band" of eight members which held forth in Pittsburgh before the war broke out. Koedel and his companions all returned to the Fatherland and took service in the army, to which the other seven have sacrificed their lives.

## DEPUTIES ROUND UP I. W. W. GANG

After Dash Thru Underbrush They Give Themselves Up

### NOW IN COUNTY JAIL

After a wild dash thru the underbrush and along the outskirts of North Renton, five men, supposed to be the gang of I. W. W.'s who beat up and robbed Angelo Monzello and a fellow laborer, on a Milwaukee freight train Friday, were captured by members of the sheriff's office late yesterday afternoon.

Monzello and a laborer, whose names are unknown, were thrown out of a box car at Barneston about 20 miles south of Renton. The unknown man was severely injured, while Monzello escaped with slight injuries. A watch and \$5 were taken.

Identifies One  
The names of the supposed hold-ups are Frank Gough, R. Gilbert, E. L. Gish, R. Gay and Don Kelly and are being held in the county on open charges, pending Deputy Prosecutor Carmody's investigation.

Monzello appeared at the county jail Saturday and identified Kelly as being one of the men who held him up. He was not certain about the rest.

Deputy Sheriff Boyd, accompanied by Deputies Spaight and Cline and Mayor Hughes and Attorney George Friend, of Renton, arrested the men after a wild dash, in which five shots were fired, the men gave up and were brought to Seattle. They denied the robbery.

## RUMANIANS ARE DRIVEN SOUTH

BERLIN, Sept. 30.—Teutonic forces have inflicted a severe defeat on the Rumanian troops that occupied Hermannstadt, former capital of Transylvania, it was officially announced this afternoon.

By an encircling attack, the Teutons drove the Rumanians southward. Part of the first Rumanian army was annihilated, the remnants fleeing in disorder.

Before the battle began German detachments seized the famous Red Tower pass, thru which the Rumanians had entered Transylvania to attack Hermannstadt. With this avenue of retreat shut off, the Rumanians fled in disorder to the mountainous country on both sides of the pass.

Nineteen property holders in Seattle will have to pay a deficit of \$20,000 in connection with the old Denny hill regrade, unless the supreme court sets Superior Judge Ronald's decision of Friday aside.

Judge Ronald decided that the supplementary assessment roll would hold good, and all who had signed "to do their just part" in the regrade must make good.

The 19 citizens, who were relieved of assessments, maintained they had been awarded nominal damages because of the regrade, and were entitled to escape all assessments.

It was discovered, when the petition was found, that all of the 19 with the exception of two signed the petition for the improvements.

## STATE WON'T GIVE WIFE DESERTER UP

OLYMPIA, Sept. 30.—Lieut. Gov. Hart refused San Diego authorities extradition papers to return Charles Gruenberg, employed in Seattle, to the South to stand trial for wife desertion.

Gruenberg demonstrated to Gov. Hart that he came to Seattle and got a job at \$12 a week, and was later raised to \$15. He further showed he had been accustomed to send his wife money, and that he expressed a willingness to make good.

Mrs. Geo. W. Aiken, national republican committee woman for this state, has appointed Mrs. Frances M. Haskell of Tacoma as her assistant.



BATTLE CREEK, Mich., Sept. 29.—Col. Roosevelt came to Battle Creek today to inject some ginger into the presidential campaign. He said so himself. He is to speak late today at an old-fashioned barbecue and rally on the circus grounds, under the auspices of five surrounding counties.

At Marshall, Mich., the colonel gave some school children a "straight" United States lecture. There were fully 30,000 at the depot here and 30,000 more along the route of the parade.

He plans to leave here about 9:30 this evening for New York. On his way back he and Ralph D. Cole, chairman of the speakers' bureau for republican headquarters, will decide how many more speeches he will make for Candidate Hughes. The matter of a Coast trip will also be settled.

## COUNTY'S BUDGET RAISES ATTACKS

Taxpayers Saturday were preparing to register several kicks at the public hearing on the county budget scheduled for Monday. One item which was causing discussion Saturday calls for \$53,000 to be spent on the upkeep of the 23 county autos during 1917.

Other items being criticised on the outside were under the head of former current expense deficits. The commissioners have planned to ask \$206,000 to make up for deficits of former years in current expenses.
